

## ARRIVAL OF THE "CITY OF BALTIMORE."

NEW YORK, FEB. 6, 1860.

### SPAIN AND MOROCCO.

A Madrid telegram of the 15th announces that the Spaniards in Morocco were masters of all the positions of Cabo Segro. After having obtained a complete victory, they were commanding all the heights of the valley of Tenuan, and would be before Tenuan as soon as the artillery was able to pass.

The latest despatch from Rome is dated on the 14th of January, and says:—

The note in *Moniteur* of the 10th inst. has produced a great sensation at the Roman Court. A meeting of Cardinals was held to-day at the Vatican. Fresh despatches from France for the Pope arrived yesterday. His Holiness has received Count Bui in a private audience. Great agitation prevails in the Marces, Bologna is to be fortified.

The resignation of the Rattazzi Cabinet in Turin is said to have resulted from the retirement of Count Walewski.

A scheme for the defensive organization of Central Italy is said to have been matured.

Letters from Florence state that in consequence of a conspiracy in favor of the Grand Duke having been discovered, several arrests had taken place.

### COMMERCIAL TREATY BETWEEN FRANCE AND ENGLAND.

The *Morning Chronicle* gives the following as the chief heads of the commercial treaty between France and England:—On the side of France suppression of prohibitions and limitation of the duties on coal or iron. On the part of England, reduction of the duties on wines, spirits, articles de Paris, and silks.

The *Times* Paris correspondent says the treaty will be signed before the week is out. Lord Cowley, he adds, has returned to Paris with full powers to do so.

A Paris letter in the *North* says the Emperor replied as follows to certain observations which have been made:—The manufacturers, who exist solely because they are protected, have been aware of my intentions for five years past, and they have had plenty of time to prepare for the change. The system of prohibitions has had its day, and I have not the power to raise the dead.

The *Debates* now praise in the most unqualified manner the proposed modifications. The Imperial plan, it observes, has nothing in common with those hasty projects which are called into existence by political necessities, but is the fruit of long and patient examination; and it remarks that although the importation of machines for agricultural purposes, and of tools, has always been strongly favored by the Emperor, the severity of the customs regulations has completely neutralized the boom.

### FRANCE.

The correspondent of the *Morning Post* sends the following telegraphic despatch: Paris, Jan. 19.—The rumor that the Pope has demanded the evacuation of Rome by the French troops is absolutely false.

Mr. Cobden again dined with Prince Napoleon on the 18th, and the Prince proposed a toast in honor of free trade.

### AUSTRIA.

The *Oest Deutsche Post* says the part which Austria has to play for a long time yet is resignation—her part is to protest against the whole world, but to support that protest with what material power she still retains would be a fatal policy.

The *Schut Public* of Lyons says a line of French steamers on the Danube is about to be established.

The official *Gazette* distinctly denies that Austria had expressed her unwillingness and inability to run the risk of another war.

### DESECTIONS FROM HUNGARIAN REGIMENTS.

VIENNA, January 20.—The following is official:—All the reports published by the Sardinian papers concerning the desertion of Hungarian soldiers from the garrison in Venice are unfounded. The results of an inquiry, ordered by the Commander-in-Chief of Verona, show that not one Hungarian soldier has deserted his colors since the conclusion of peace at Villafranca. Several secret agents, however, have been arrested for endeavoring to tamper with the Hungarian regiments.

### ROME.

A letter from Rome, of the 14th, in the *Pays*, says some detachments of Swiss soldiers have been attacked by the population of the Marches. At Macerata a sharp contest is spoken of as having taken place. Cardinal Antonelli's budget exhibits a total deficit of 707,897 crowns.

### CHINA.

The *Northern Bee* published a letter from a member of the Russian mission at Peking.

The Chinese have received a large quantity of silver from Russia, and are now able to give their soldiers one-third of their pay in that metal, the paper money having become greatly depreciated.

### THE BOMBAY RAILS.

The *Valetta*, with the Bombay mails arrived at Marseilles at eight o'clock yesterday morning. The mails left for London at ten. The letters will be delivered on Saturday.

### BRAZILS.

The *Post* says, we have authority to state that the brief of the Portuguese Government in the prevalence of yellow fever in all the ports of Brazil is contradicted by insurances which the Brazilian Minister has received from the Imperial Government by the last steamer, that the health of those ports was, at the time of her departure, good.

## THE VERY LATEST.

LONDON, Jan. 21, 1860.

A Paris despatch in the *London Post* says that in the political world people are again beginning to think seriously of a Congress.

The *London Star* thinks it not improbable that the commercial treaty between France and England may be signed before the delivery of the Queen's speech on Tuesday.

The *London Herald* goes so far as to say that there seems little doubt that the treaty has been already signed, and that it will come into operation in this country immediately.

The *London Herald* says the Archbishop of Paris has resigned his seat in the Council of the Empire. This Council was created to guard the interests of the Napoleon dynasty, in case of the Emperor's death. The Archbishop's withdrawal is expected to give a more determined attitude to the clerical party in opposition to the Emperor's anti-Papal policy.

Sir Etienne Tache has been elected President of the Council of Public Instruction for Lower Canada.

A man named William Percival is under arrest in London, C. W., charged with stabbing his sister. The wound inflicted in a very severe one, and it is feared will prove mortal; it has perforated one of the lungs, and little hopes are at present entertained of her recovery.

**MANUMISSION OF A BEAUTIFUL SLAVE.**—A young female, of almost classic beauty, about 18 years old, so nearly white that the tinge of African blood in her veins was scarcely perceptible, and perfect enough in form and feature to have served as a model for a *Protagoras* or a *Powers*, was yesterday manumitted in the Probate Court by a well known New Orleans merchant. Her countenance was beaming, expressive, and intelligent, and her dark eyes brilliant, melting, and tender, and her general appearance quite *spirituelle*, owing partly to the worm of consumption that was evidently feeding on her cheek. She was elegantly attired, and in point of personal appearance would have pleased favourably with the most fashionable Fourth street belle.—*Cincinnati Enquirer*, Jan. 22.
