On Sunday the family were much annoyed by the nauseous smell of gas, and as it was not used in the house much surprise was manifested as to the course from which it emanated. The air, however which it emanated. The air, however was not so largely impregnated with it as to cause any alarm, and in the evening they retired to rest at the usual hour Miss Kerr remaining for the night with her friend Miss McLean, who for some time previously had been in poor health. In the morning, about half-past eight o'clock a cabman named Hammell called at the house according to his usual practice to conyey Mr. Henderson to the Custom-house. He was not a little surprised to find the premises closed, and no pine apparently within the house, as his repeated knocks at the door rengained unanswered. While in a state of uncertainty as to his course in the matter, a lady answered. While in a state of incertainty as to his course in the matter, a lady friend of Miss McLean's came up for the purpose of ascertaining the coadition of the invalid. The surprise of the cabman was shared in by her; and not deeming it possible that the inpates bad left the house that early, the, considerably alarmed proceeded to the house of Captain Kerr, the father of Miss Kerr, on Denison Arenue. To him she related the strange occurrance and he immediately hastened to Mr. Henderson's to learn for him elf the Mr. Henderson's to learn for himself the cause of it. Forcing an enterance by a door in the rear, he rushed into the building to find the unfortunates lying apparently dead in their respective bedrooms. A strong suffocating smell of gas pervaded all the appartments. This sufficiently explained the reason of the insensibility of the inmates. It was found an examinates that the force of the control of the cont of the inmates. It was found an examination that fortunately in no case was his extinct. They were than removed as expeditiously as possible to the house of Mr. Haliwel, an the opposite side of the street, and medical assistance summoned. street, and medical assistance summoned. This was about nine o'gloca; and shortly afterwards. Drs. Rolph, Smail, Agnew, Wright, Halowell, and another appeared in obidence to the startling summons they had received that a whole family had been poisoned. They found the patients in deep asphyxiated state, produced by breathing carbonic exyde. The case presented all the symptoms of what is known as 'coal-gas poisoning.' The medical gentlemen immediately consulted as to the best means to be adopted, and in their subsequent proceedings worked toas to the best means to the adoption, and their subsequent proceedings worked to-gather with an accord truly praiseworthy. The ordinary treatment was resorted to, that of stimulation, &c., It was discovered that Miss Kerr was the most dangerously affected, and to her consequently the most earnest efforts were directed. In the course of the afternoon the others revived; and at six o'clock Mr Henderretived; and at six o'clock Mr Henderson was sufficiently restored to render practicable his removal to the house of a friend. The medical gentlemen were unremitting in their attentions to other sufferers, and by their aid Miss McLean and the servant gradually recovered from the stupor into which they had fallen. Not so, howeven was it with Miss Kerr. Notwithstanding that every expedient calculated to preserve life was resorted to, the effect was not apparently beneficial; the effect was not apparently beneficial. and at a late hour last night very serious apprehensions existed as to her safety. The friends of the different parties, as may be supposed, were excredingly alarmed, and the affair created a very painful impression throughout the city yesterday. On inquiry it was discopered that this singular excitant was attributable to the singular accident was attributable to the bursting of a gaspipe in the street, at a spot about thirty feet from the house. The poisonous matter found its way into the building by means of the drams leading from it into the main sewer, and had ing from it into the main sewer, and had been esceping in this manner almost unpoticed for a day or two previously. It gradually filled the house; and when on Sunday night the doors, windows and other passages for its east were clossed, the inmates became the victims of its poisoning qualities. Had they inhaled the noxious and deadly vapor for an hour or two longer it is probable that none in the house would have survived.
