It may be well then to publish, for the information of the parties interested, a list of the articles which are exempt from seizure, under any

of tongs and shovel, one table, six chairs, of tongs and shovel, one table, sex chairs, six knives, six forks, six plates, six teacups six saucers, one sugar basin, one milk jug, one teapot, six spoons, all spinning wheels and weaving looons in domestic use, and ten volumes of books, one axe, one saw,

ten volumes of books, one axe, one saw, one gun, six traps, and such fishing rets and seines as are in common use;

"4. All necessary fuel, meat, fish, flour, and regetables, actually provided for family use, not more than sufficient for the orlinary consumption of the debtor and his

diaary consumption of the debtor and his family for thirty days, and not execeding in value the sum of forty dollars;

"5. One cow, four sheep, two hogs, and food therefor, for forty days;

"6. Tools and implements of or chattels ordinarity used in the debtor's occupation to the value of sixty dollars;

"5. Nothing in this Act contained shall exempt from seizure in satisfaction of a debt contracted for such indentical chattel.

"6. The debtor may select out of any select out of any

larger number the several chattels exempt from seizure under this Act.
