stationed all round the country, which exactly
squares with my ideas. I have only time to
add that I am in great haste.

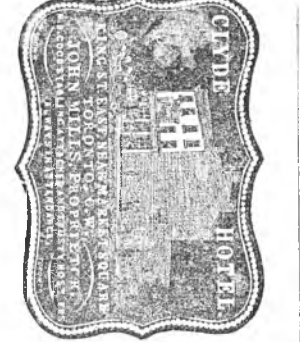
