

## THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

**PILOT KNOW, Oct. 22.**  
The following dispatch was received here this morning and forwarded to headquarters at St. Louis:

**FIELD OF BATTLE, Fredericksburg, Oct. 22.**

In conjunction with Colonel Plummer's command, we have routed the Confederates under Thompson and Lowe, estimated at 5,000. Their loss is heavy; ours small, and confined principally to the first Indian Cavalry. We captured four heavy guns.

Lowe, one of the Confederate officers, was killed. Major Gavitt and Captain Hyman, of the Indiana Cavalry, were killed in a charge on a battery.

The command of Colonel Plummer, referred to above, was on Friday morning last ordered forward by General Grant from Cape Girardeau, with instructions to move forward to Fredericksburg and cut off the retreat of Thompson and Lowe's army.

**New York, Oct. 23.**  
Military affairs in Kentucky are still in statu quo.

Mr. Muir, British consul at New Orleans, has arrived here from that city, having been twenty-four days en route.

The army of the Potomac has been divided into corps d'armee each comprising from 30,000 to 50,000 men.

Powerful batteries have been erected along the James River in Eastern Virginia, in anticipation of an advance of the Federal army in that direction.

Chaplains are enlisting in large numbers in the rebel army. One Arkansas regiment boasts of having eight, and another fifty—mostly Methodists!

The Federal Government is organizing an expedition to proceed from California, overland, against the western part of Texas and to be under the command of General Sumner.

It is put down as among the encouraging signs of the times that Baltimore, which a few months ago was as strongly secession as any part of the South, last week elected municipal officers of the Union stripe.

The President, Secretary Seward, and General McClellan met General Banks, a few days since, near Muldy River, at the camp of the New York Nineteenth, where an hour was spent in private intercourse.

We have an account of an attack upon the notorious Billy Wilson Zouaves in Florida by the Confederates. Details of the affair have not reached here, but it is reported that forty of the Zouaves were killed, and double that number wounded.

Secretary Cameron went to Missouri last week at the request of the President, to examine the condition of affairs in that Department, and he professes himself highly gratified with the condition of General Fremont's army.

According to a telegram from General Rosecrans, who is stationed in the mountains of Western Virginia, he will be able to fully sustain himself against the combined forces of all the troops the Confederates are likely to bring against him.

The United States Commissioner of Indian Affairs has returned to Washington from an official visit to the tribes in Kansas and Nebraska. He was well received, and was assured of the friendly feelings they entertain towards the National Government.

General Beauregard was at Manassas, and Jeff. Davis had returned to Richmond at the latest advices in feeble health. Speculations were rife as to his successor in the Presidency of the Confederate States. The election takes place next month.

From Santa Fe, New Mexico, information has been received of an attack upon Fort M'Henry by four hundred Navajos. The troops in the fort, however, repulsed the rebels, killing twenty and taking twenty four prisoners, yet suffering the small loss of but one wounded.

An Irishman, who was giving his testimony in the Boston Municipal Court lately, convulsed the bar, tickled the jury, and raised a smile on the bench, by the following statement: "Ye see, mayn't plaze ye, that this man got a stroke and fell down. Everybody around called out, 'Oh, he's kilt! he's kilt!' 'Till I steps up, and I hollied out to the crowd, 'If the map is kilt, why don't ye stand back, and give him a little air.'"
