World's Fair Letter.

"As water to a thirsty land;
So is news from a far country."

It is acknowledged that the selection
of Chicago as the place for the Fair was
eminently wise. Not only is the city
well suited on account of its great central
position and easy access by rail, but it
has the most appropriate grounds. It
has been enabled to add a water feature
in the shape of canals and lagoons, which
form one of the most attractive features
of the Fair.

The grounds cover about six hundred
acres. No time in history has there
been such a display of the skilled genius
of man as may now be seen in the ar-
chitecture of the colossal buildings, per-
fection and usefulness of the exhibits and
the beauty of the landscape gardening.
The exhibits are beyond all description—
they must be seen, to have any idea of
the vastness, the magnificence of the
productions of other countries here re-
presented.

It seems to me that we have the whole
world passed in review before us in an
area of a square mile. In fact the whole
thing is so stupendous that it is almost
overpowering.

It is something everyone should see.
In all probability its like will never be
seen again, and certainly it is the grand-
est undertaking in its line ever carried
out or even conceived up to the present
time. You could not contemplate its
vast extent and brilliancy. It is a mag-
nificent achievement of American en-

visit the Fair from day to day. In con-

News Notes.

It is stated that immediately upon his
return from England Mr. Dalton McCar-

the tariff question. Arrangements have
been made for a series of political pic-
nics.

Tuesday being the sixtieth anniversary
of the liberation of the slaves in the
British West Indies, was appropriately
celebrated in Toronto, Hamilton, and
other places in Ontario by the coloured
population.

The Montreal *Monde*, referring to
Mayor Desjardins' action in refusing to
preside at the committee to receive the
admiral and officers of the Italian
man-of-war *Etna*, said last night that
Mr. Desjardins should not forget that as
Mayor he should be above individual
opinion, and if his scruples became
stronger than the duties of his office,
there should be nothing left but for him
to retire.

Le Canada, commenting upon the
Tache-Tarte controversy, regrets that the
French Canadian bishops are too often
found aiding the Government against the
people, and trusting too much to diplo-
macy and "private but solemn prom-
ises."

In the absence of Mr. Mackenzie Bow-
ell, who is attending the Orange conven-
tion at the Soo, Mr. Patterson, Minister
