Railway to Toronto.

Contracts for the construction of the James Bay Railway from Toronto to Parry Sound were let yesterday. The contractors are Angus Sinclair, C. E., and the firm of A. R. Mann & Archie Mackenzie. Mr. Sinclair, who has the construction of the Parry Sound end of the line, has just finished the construction of 100 miles of work for Mackenzie, Mann & Com pany, including grading and masomy, in Nova Scotia. Messrs. A. R. Mann & Archie Mackenzie have been engagon several contracts on various portions of the Canadian Northern Railway in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories. The contracts made call for the completion of the work by September, 1905. In the course of a few days it is expected the contract will be let for the construction of the line between Parry Sound and Sud-

The above contracts are to a point on the Northern city limits, where the old belt line route will be touched, thence along the Don valley, but the terminals in Toronto are not included in these contracts.

The Russian Vladivostok fleet has managed to get into the Pacific Ocean, and has begun preying upon the eastern coast of Japan. Already one merchant ship has been captured. This news has interest for Canadians. for, if the precedent set in the Red Sea is allowed the C. P. R. Empress Liners running from Vancouver will be in danger of capture.
