

## EDITORIAL

The following personal message from Earl Kitchener should inspire every British soldier to be MEN in the truest, best sense of the word: "Fear God; honour your King and country; abstain from liquor and looting; be courteous to women—more than courteous."

Canada is united with reference to the war now raging on the European continent. In Parliament yesterday it was plainly shown by the Premier and the Leader of the Opposition that all were prepared to do their duty in the defence of Canada and the Empire. Officially there is little to report relative to the progress of the war, but the opposing armies are drawing nearer together, and sanguinary battles are sure to take place in a few days.

### A GOOD MOVE

For years past the annual farce of fining the boats on Lake Ontario for the selling of liquor without a license has been perpetrated by the License Department. The rule has been to allow the large Lake boats to sell undisturbed, but to inflict a fine on each of the pursers near the end of the season. Needless to say the fines with the costs added are very small compared with what any other liquor seller, operating under a license, would have to pay for a bar which has such patronage as any one of the seven large boats. The liquor license law states under Section 10 of the Act "That liquor shall not be sold nor kept for sale in any room or in any place on any such vessel."

It is satisfactory to learn, however, that Chief License Inspector Burrows, a few days ago, issued an order that all liquor be removed from these vessels in 24 hours. Mr. Burrows stated that if liquor was not speedily removed it would be seized by the authorities. This is right. To allow liquor to be sold every day on boats, and fine the owners but once a year is no better than a farce.

### Runaways

Mr. H. R. Heise of New Gornley has had three runaways recently. The first on Wm. Carlisle's farm, while he was assisting Mr. L. B. Schell, to draw sand for his new house, while they were about to double teams up a steep hill Mr. Heise's team started off and circled the hill until they came to a high wire fence, where the young mare was thrown over the fence, with a post between them, so they got no farther. The second, occurred at the C. N. R. station, while he was getting a load of coal. The mail train came along, the horses started off with the load, jumped a wire fence breaking off two posts and got the wagon fast in the wire and got no farther. The third took place last Saturday, while he was drawing in his grain. He had little Willie Woodward driving for him, who slipped off the front of the load and fell on the tongue. The team took fright and took a circle around the field and were stopped by Mr. B. Climenhaga who was pitching for him. Some broken harness and a few scratches was all the damage done. When the horses were stopped, the boy was still on the tongue of the waggon. The neighbors say that Mr. Heise had better feed less oats. Cor.

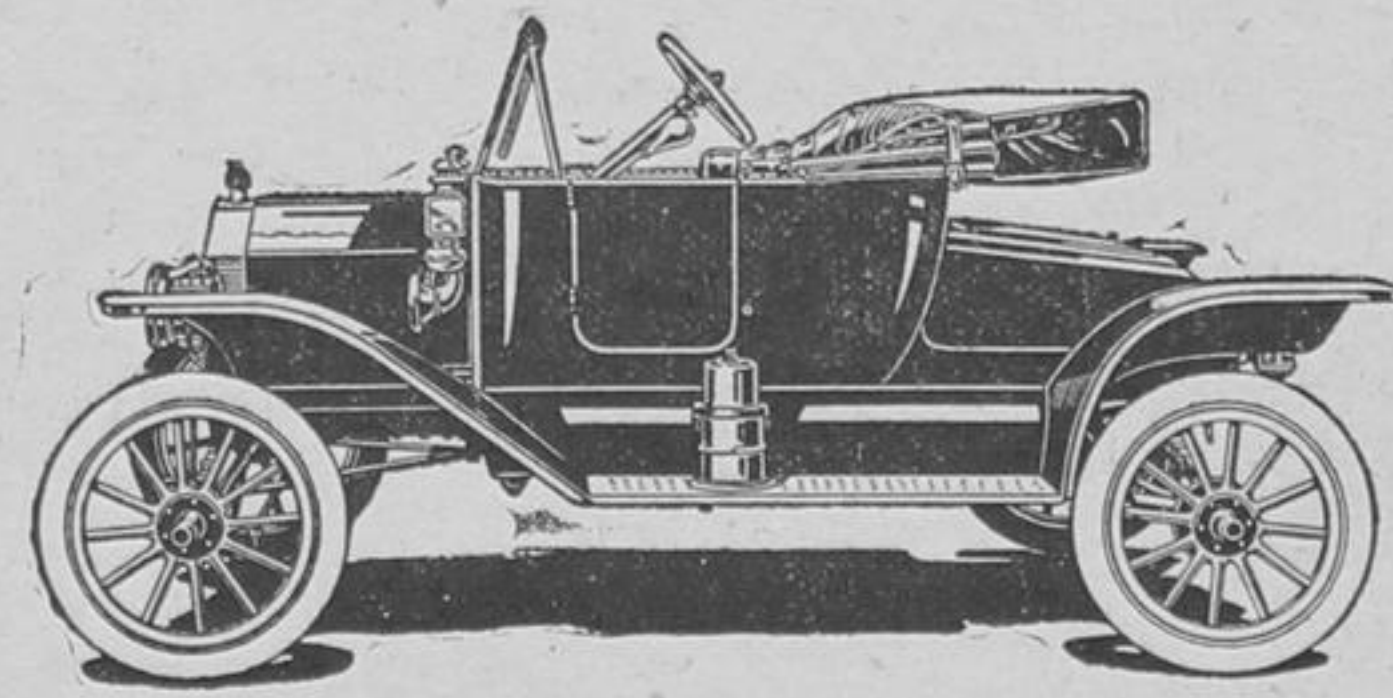
