### CO-OPERATION AND ACHIEVEMENT

In these days of greed and plunder, it's excusable to wonder As to what to do and what to leave undone; Whether follow up the harrow, swing a pick or wheel a barrow Swell production or pursue the fleeing Hun.

These are the days, when men, in all conditions of society, are waking out of their long sleep, and asking themselves: "How can I be of service? What could I do to help on the good cause for which we are fighting?" Young men scarcely out of their teens, are going away, asking: "Where can I be used to the greatest advantage?" Middle aged men, who have ties that hold them at home, are asking: "Surely there must be something I could do right here that would equal the valour and the courage of the boys who have gone!" Old men, scarcely able to move out of their shops or hold a spade to their feet are saying: "We read the Globe in the morning and the News at night and the Bible on Sunday, and no one expects anything more of us. It is only the younger men who can help towards any worthy accomplishment."

They are the only ones who have any real excuse to give as to what to do and what to leave undone. But they, LIKE SINBAD's ship to the Loadstone Mountain, are drawn to their spades and their hoes, and one of them puts it this way: "We read so much in the newspapers about 'swelling production', that we cannot resist the tide BECAUSE WE DO NOT, and we are literally drawn into our gardens and potato-patches, before breakfast and after breakfast, often to the neglect of our business, and though we recognize that co-operation is the secret of men 'on the march', we are not walking but working, and we 'do our bit' in our own simple way. That is about the only way we can help that we know."

"If co-operation is required of us, I could not go around to my neighbour next door and ask him to work alongside of me in my garden and let me work alongside of him in his garden, alternatively, because he works sitting down, and if HE DID UNDERSTAND hard work, he is better at solving problems. I should not care to ask No. 2, because, while HE HAS THE TIME, he is a Liberal and I am a Conservative and could not understand Coalition. I would not care to ask No. 3, because, though HE COULD UNDERSTAND coalition, he disagreed with me in the church years ago, and is not big enough to sink his differences now for anything short of helping 'the fleeing Hun' across the Rhine."

"If co-operation be required, three or four of us could better co-operate with Mr. Hanna, at night, at a ROUND TABLE in a Dietetical SOCIETY, and what would be lacking in meat could be made up in conversation, and what would be lacking in religion could be made up in patriotism, and what would be lacking in courage could be made up in cabbage-salads. If it were a matter of dollars and cents, in helping on the cause, there would be no difficulty in that, but as for this co-operation plan we do not understand it, and until we hear more of it in the newspapers, we refuse to MAKE A MOVE or be drawn together for anything short of a food-dictated supper, and we will hoe our own row."

These are the public-spirited Canadians as you find them to-day. Once they know why they are needed, and how they can help, show them a good cause, and they are ready to the last man and the last dollar, to sink their differences, and turn their hands to the plow.

Lamennais writes in his "PAROLES D'UN CROYANT," Chap. VII, of a man who was travelling in the mountains: "He came to a place where a great rock, having been rolled on to the highway, filled it up completely, and except for the road, there was no outlet, either to the left or to the right."

"Now, this man, seeing that he would not be able to continue on his journey, because of the rock, essayed to move it, so that he could get past, and he tired himself out by his efforts, and all his work was in vain."

"Seeing this, he sat down full of sadness, and said: 'What will become of me if night comes on and overtakes me in this solitude, without nourishment, without shelter, without any defence when the wild beasts come to seek their prey.'"

"And, as he was absorbed with these thoughts, another traveller came up, and he too, having done the same as the first, and finding himself unable to remove the rock, sat down in silence and hung his head."

"And after this one, several others came along, and none of them in their turn could budge the rock, and great fear was shared by them all."

"At last, one of them said to the others: 'My comrades, let us pray to our Father who is in Heaven; perhaps

He will have pity on us in our distress. 'And this prayer was heard, and they prayed from their hearts to their Father in Heaven."

"And after they had prayed, the one who had said, 'Let us pray,' said again: 'My brothers, that, which no one of us could do - ALONE - who knows we would not ACCOMPLISH BY CO-OPERATION?'"

"And they got up on their feet, and ALL TOGETHER they heaved against the rock, and the rock gave way, and they continued on their way in peace."

"The traveller is man, the journey is this life, the rock is the miseries that are encountered by each and every one on the way."
