

TOWN COUNCIL DEFERS ACTION ON TENDERS FOR ARENA ROOF

Members Insist Work Ordered By Council Will Be Carried Out.

Richmond Hill council met in regular session in the clerk's office on Tuesday evening with Reeve Lunau in the chair and all the members present. The tenders for the new roof for the arena were opened but no action taken as the members thought the matter worthy of further discussion and will look further into the merits of roofing materials. Tenders for galvanized roofing were received from R. W. Atkinson, Richmond Hill; Robt. Michael, Richmond Hill and E. Steckley, Gormley and tender prices ranged between \$1568. and \$1695. An Industrial Roofing concern offered to apply their roofing over the present roof at a cost of \$500. and would give a guarantee of five years. This proposition was favorably received by some of the members while others appeared favorable to putting on a galvanized roof. It was suggested that the smoke of large chimneys here would be deteriorating to the metal roof and there was also a difference of opinion as to whether or not the old roofing should be removed if galvanized material was decided upon. In all there were so many points on which the members were at variance that the matter was left over for a special meeting. In the meantime expert advice will be sought and the representative of the Industrial Roofing Company who made the \$500. offer will be interviewed and another well known and reliable roofing firm will be communicated with as to prices.

Following the reading of the minutes Councillor Mansbridge wanted to know if anything had been done about removing the old scales as decided at the last meeting. Reeve Lunau reported that nothing had been done yet. Councillor Sims complained that the town workmen had been assigned to new work before work ordered by the council was done. There were many things ordered by the council standing on the books which he would like to see cleaned up. Councillor Middleton wanted to know if the school signs had been moved, and when told by the Reeve that they had not he wanted to know why they had not been attended to. "I don't see any use of all of the council going around the town and deciding to have things done for its never done" he said.

Reeve Lunau — Well I suggest that Mr. Middleton be a committee to have this work done.

Mr. Mansbridge — I second that motion.

Mr. Middleton — Just a minute now, I saw the Reeve a week or more ago and he said yes, it would be done before school started, now why hasn't it been done.

Mr. Mansbridge — I think the suggestion of the Reeve is a good one. The members should relieve him of many of the burdens he is asked to carry, and if Mr. Middleton don't want to do it, if someone will make a motion I'll be glad to see after this job.

Mr. Middleton — I am willing to do my share any time, but there have been different things just the same as this all year.

Councillor Davis said he was in favor of a policy whereby all work ordered by the council would be cleaned up as it was ordered. "If we go on as we have at the end of the year we will be nowhere" he said.

Reeve Lunau suggested that a few loads of gravel be placed down near the station where it had been washed out. Councillor Sims suggested that a committee be appointed to look the situation over, and Councillors Middleton and Sims were appointed as this was in their districts. Reeve Lunau said he thought every councillor should keep an inspection of his own territory and recommend what should be done. That was what he tried to do but when he saw something to be done and wanted it fixed he was accused of being a one man council he said.

Councillor Sims — I have had a number of complaints, but now I tell people to either come or write to the council. What I object to is that there is work on those minutes ordered two and three months ago not done yet. At last council meeting we would suggest this or that thing but were told the same story "no money." And the very next morning after the council meeting there was work being done of which the council heard never a word.

Reeve Lunau — What was that?

Mr. Sims — A man walking around town with a scythe looking for weeds. Reeve Lunau — We as a council decided to cut the weeds.

Mr. Sims — Not to keep at it all summer.

A new petition from residents on Church Street was presented asking for a sidewalk on the west side of

Church Street from Centre to Dufferin Street. A petition for this work was presented three years ago, but the new petition asked that the work be done this fall. Councillor Sims moved that a four foot walk be built and that the work be commenced as soon as possible. Councillor Mansbridge seconded the motion. The question of "where will the money come from" was brought up by councillor Middleton and Reeve Lunau said he would have liked to see the walk on the east side of Yonge Street which was used by many more people built first. On second consideration Councillor Mansbridge withdrew his name from the original motion and moved that the clerk write the petitioners stating that the council would ask that the petitioners let the request stand over for the present. This was seconded by councillor Davis and carried with councillor Sims opposed.

Councillor Davis wanted to know if something could not be done to Richmond and Mill Streets. Reeve Lunau said that this would be considered later in the season.

The question of stray dogs was introduced by councillor Middleton. The members who were unanimous in agreeing that they were a nuisance and the authorities will take action against the owners of any dogs which are a nuisance.

Regarding the decision of the council at the last meeting to allow the initial payment for the installation of the waterworks to be met on the installment plan it was decided to make a charge of six per cent. on the unpaid portion. The charge can be paid in four instalments but six per cent. will be charged on the unpaid portion. It was argued that this was only fair as the town had to pay for the work and if they didn't have the money had to go to the bank and borrow it. Councillor Middleton thought if we secured more water users it would be still good business even if we lost the interest for part of a year. Later however he seconded a motion of councillor Mansbridge that there be a charge of six per cent. Councillor Sims thought that this put the whole thing right back where it started and spoiled the effectiveness of the inducement.

Honorable George, aged ten, and Honorable John, aged 9, sons of Canada's ranching peer, Lord Rodney and descendants of a famous British Admiral, recently travelled 4,000 miles from Port Saskatchewan, Alta., to England, to enter a public school in the Old Country. They took the long journey unaccompanied, travelling on Canadian Pacific lines and by S.S. Montclare. C. P. R. officials looked after them on the long trip.

Rt. Hon. L. C. M. S. Amery, secretary for the Dominions in the Baldwin administration, who arrived in Canada on the Express of Australia recently travelled straight across the Dominion by Trans-Canada Limited, crack Canadian Pacific flyer, for Banff and Lake Louise whence he reached his objective and namesake, 11,000-foot peak which he will climb.

Miss Georgia Englehard, daughter of a New York lawyer, is busy scaling peaks and establishing climbing records around Lake Louise. She climbed six peaks up to 12,000 feet in height around Lake O'Hara in one week. In addition to these exploits she has made a three weeks pack train trip.

Adding to an imposing list of winnings gained at leading exhibitions over the prairie circuit earlier in the season, the championship Holstein herd of the Canadian Pacific Railway supply at Strathmore Farm gathered ten firsts, five seconds, five thirds at the Vancouver Fair, made a clean sweep in the bull classes with junior and reserve senior championships in female classes and in group classes won first for exhibitors, first for young herd, first for progeny of cow, second in breeders herd and second in get of sire.

Judges of piping and dancing at the forthcoming Banff Highland Gathering and Scottish music festival to be held August 30, September 2 have been announced. They are, Colonel Alexander Fraser, Donald E. MacPherson, Murdoch McLeod, George Murray, all of Toronto; William Ferguson, of North Bay; Neil Sutherland, of Regina; and Alexander Hosie of Medicine Hat. Coincident with the Festival, the Dominion Field and Track championships will be decided at Banff Labor Day.

Output of creamery butter in Saskatchewan for the first six months of the year is exactly 45% greater than for the similar period in 1928, according to a report of the dairy branch of the provincial department of Agriculture. In the first half of 1929 it was 6,128,044 as against 4,215,349 pounds in the first half of 1928.

The Canadian Pacific Railway will be represented at Fall Exhibitions in Eastern Canada this year at Toronto, Quebec, Sherbrooke, Saint John and Fredericton by models of the system's scenic, hotel, oriental and general details of the company's travel, express and telegraph activities. There will be a special building devoted to C. P. R. matters at the Toronto Exhibition, while activities dealing with other parts of the country will be shown at other cities. A number of special trains will be run to these Exhibitions.
