

## MARKHAM

Mrs. Thomas Morgan, one of Markham's oldest and most respected citizens passed away at her home on Main Street, Tuesday evening, September 24th, following a long illness. The deceased, a daughter of the late James Kenning, was born near Campbellville, Halton County, in 1851 and in 1885 she was married to Mr. Thomas Morgan, who predeceased her 15 years ago. Mrs. Morgan was the last of the Morgan family of Markham, who purchased in 1832 the present property on Main Street in which the family continuously resided. One sister, Mrs. Porter, Vanvouver, B. C., and an adopted daughter, Mrs. E. Duncan, of Toronto, survive her; also a number of nephews and nieces. Mrs. Morgan was a strong and active continuing Presbyterian, being especially interested in the New St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Markham. Continuing the practice of her late husband and brother-in-law Geo. Morgan, who had given large sums for public and charitable purposes. Mrs. Morgan also gave very substantial amounts for charitable, church and public purposes. Morgan memorial park having been established by this village to commemorate the family. A host of friends mourn the loss of a kind neighbor and sympathetic friend. The funeral services were held at the residence, Main Street on Friday afternoon, September 27th. Rev. W. H. Fuller officiated with Rev. Eakin, D. D., President of Knox College, Toronto and Rev. Jas. Wilson, D. D., Brampton, also having part in the service. Interment in the family plot St. Andrew's cemetery.


## OBITUARY

Who represented North York in the Ontario Legislature in the last parliament was unanimously chosen as the Liberal candidate in the present election at an enthusiastic convention held in Newmarket on Wednesday evening.

Three weeks from next Wednesday is election day.

At an enthusiastic convention held at the R. H. McGregor school on Saturday last Hon. G. S. Henry was unanimously chosen conservative candidate in East York.

The Liberals of the riding of East York held a convention to-night to name an opponent to the Ferguson government candidate.

Clifford Case, of Aurora, will contest the riding of North York in the conservative interests at the coming election.

The Liberals of South York are holding a convention in Silverthorn, Memorial Hall, Silverthorn, on Saturday, October 5th, at 2.30 o'clock.

Nomination of a suitable candidate to contest the riding will take place at this meeting and election of officers for South York riding will also be effected.

Recently there has been formed, in Fairbank, Mount Dennis and Silverthorn a series of Liberal Community clubs, each staunchly backing Liberal ideals.

Enthusiastic representations from their bodies will be at the meeting. Delegates from Woodbridge, Thistleton, Forest Hill Village, and Vaughan, have signified their intention of bringing large numbers to take part. The meeting will be conducted under P. J. Mulqueen, chairman of the Olympic Committee and well known Liberal. This gentleman will be chairman.

The town hall, Newmarket was packed at the convention held in Newmarket on Wednesday evening, when P. W. Pearson was named as the Liberal candidate in North York. The principal speaker was Mr. W. E. N. Sinclair, leader of the Liberal party in Ontario and his clear cut discussion of the issues of the election and his outline of policy was very favorably received by the large gathering. Hon. Nelson Parliament, Dr. Boyd Wesley Williams, Morgan Baker and the candidate Mr. Pearson also gave addresses.

An organization meeting of temperance workers will be held in the Masonic Hall, Richmond Hill to-night when the present campaign will be discussed and organization set in motion.


