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Nine Appeals Considered At The Court of Revision

REDUCTIONS IN FOUR CASES AND IN FIVE THE ASSES- MENT SUSTAINED

There were nine appeals against the assessment of the village of Richmond Hill, dealt with by the Court of Revision on Monday evening. In five cases the assessment was sustained and in four cases reductions were allowed. Reeve Lunau presided and all the members of the council were present.

The first appeal dealt with was that of Y.B. Tracey on the Innes property which he recently purchased. The assessment was sustained on motion of councillors Mansbridge and Middleton when it was pointed out that the assessment made this year did not assess anything on the old buildings which were assessed last year and which were the basis of the appeal.

Stanley Tyndall appealed against the assessment of his thirty six acres in the village. He pointed out that he was assessed at \$75.00 per acre in Richmond Hill and at \$50. per acre for the portion of his farm which was in Vaughan township. He was paying \$8.00 an acre taxes on 36 acres in the village and he felt it was too much. On his land in the township he pays \$1.75 per acre. On motion of councillors Middleton and Davis the assessment was reduced to \$60. per acre.

Mr. E. Rand appealed against the assessment of his property which is \$850. He was under the impression it was raised \$25. this year but the books showed it the same as last year and as the members thought it compared favorably with the assessment of similar properties the assessment was confirmed on motion of Council-

lors Middleton and Davis.
A. E. Glass appealed against the assessment of his five acre lot on Richmond Street. The present assessment is \$187. per acre and he suggested that it be reduced to about \$100. per acre. The members felt that it was not assessed too high compared to other properties and on motion of councillors Mansbridge and H. Davis the assessment was sustained.

Dr. L. S. M. Hamilton appealed the assessment of \$850 on house and lot on Richmond Street. Assessment sustained.

The McCabe Estate were granted a reduction of \$1875 on their property on Yonge Street which was the assessment of the theatre building which has been removed. No change was made in the assessment of the land.

Arthur Scatter, Trench Street, appealed against the assessment of \$18-75. on his house and lot. The lot is assessed at \$650 and the house at \$1175. He pointed out that the land was low and that the house although brick clad was similar to others assessed at a much lower figure. The assessment on the house was reduced to \$1000. on motion of councillor Sims and Davis.

The assessment of \$725 on the property of Robert Dickie, Richmond Street was sustained on motion of councillors Mansbridge and Sims.
F. E. Sims appealed against the assessment of \$300 on his fifty foot lot on Baker Avenue. "This lot" said Mr. Sims, "is assessed for more than I paid for it, and for more than I am willing to sell it for. I'm not asking any favors but I want a fair decent assessment." On motion of councillors Middleton and Davis the assessment on the lot was reduced fifty dollars bringing it down to \$250.

In addition a special competition will be conducted at the Royal, open only to winners of horseshoe pitching competition held by local agricultural fair associations for the best team of two players.
