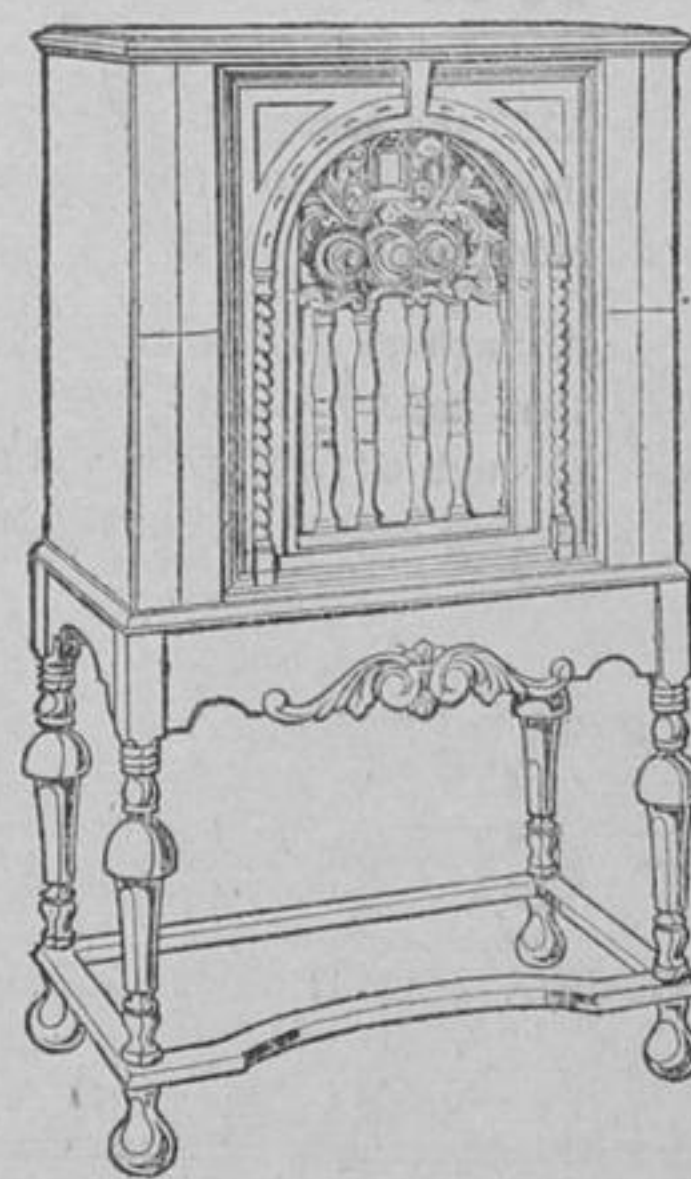

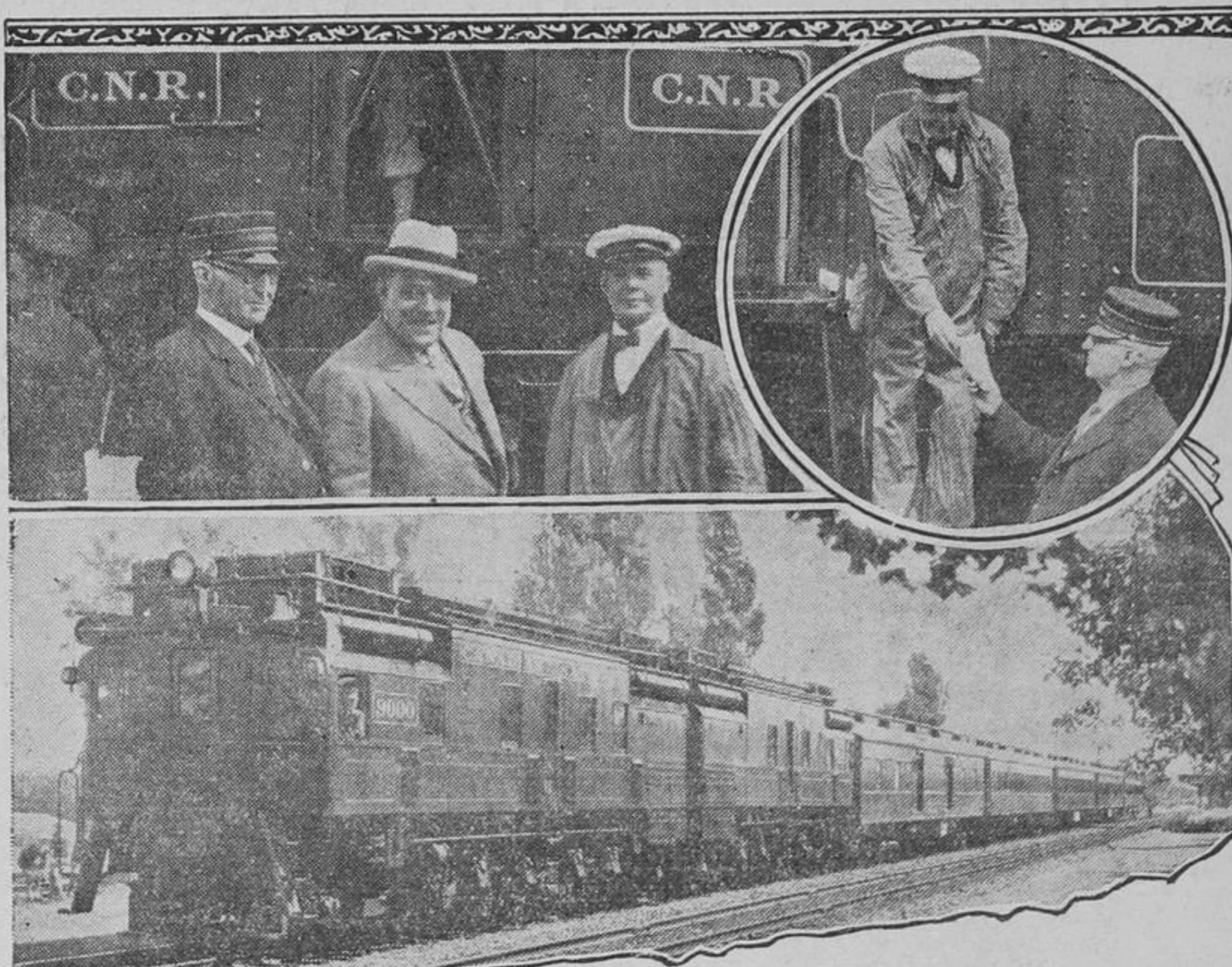

"CHALLENGER OF STEAM"

Railroad motive power develop-
ment took another important
step forward when oil electric
locomotive No. 9000 of the Cana-
dian National Railways made its
inaugural run between Montreal
and Toronto, hauling a section of
the famous "International Lim-
ited", crack all-steel train which
operates between Montreal, Tor-
onto, Detroit and Chicago. The
new motive power unit emerged
with honors from the grilling

test, hauling the heavy train at
high speed over the 340 miles of
line and in some places attaining
a speed in excess of eighty miles
per hour. Experts who were
aboard the train expressed the
opinion that eventually this type
of motive power will supersede
the steam locomotive.
Locomotive 9000, which is 94
feet in length, and weighs 310
tons fully equipped, develops 3000
horse power. It consists of two

units, each powered with an oil
engine generator, which, in turn,
delivers power to the electric pro-
pulsion motors which operate the
train.
Canadian National engineers
have discovered that with this en-
gine seven times the power is
secured from a unit of heat gener-
ated by fuel oil as against heat
generated in a steam locomotive
by use of coal.
