

# King Juniors in fine showing at Caledon East tournament

The King City Junior softball team came up with a fine showing in the Caledon East tournament winning four games and losing two in a grueling weekend which saw them playing 50 innings of ball.

King City opened the tournament with a 2-1 win over Brampton, lost 4-0 to A & A Caterers of

Bramalea, beat Brampton again by 1-0, then the Caterers by 9-5 and 3-2 before being eliminated by Procor 3-1.

The King City crew did come up with one big bauble of the tournament. Pitcher Mike Unterlander was selected as the top pitcher of the tournament.

He earned the honor by a standout job of relief pitching throughout the tournament and by carving out a 14-inning 1-0 victory over Brampton. That game saw Unterlander yielding nine hits over the 14 innings, striking out four batsmen and walking none.

The King team opened the tournament with Ken

Griffith and Unterlander combining to toss a four-hitter against Brampton. Following the 4-0 loss to Caterers came the 1-0 triumph with King's winning run engineered by Fran O'Neill's single. He was sacrificed to second and came home on an error.

The 9-5 win against the Caterers in the second match between the two teams was tied 5-5 after seven regulation innings.

King then exploded in the eighth for four runs as O'Neil doubled and Les Fleury was hit by a pitch. Then followed three straight singles by Dennis Griffiths, Don Munro and Karl Taylor.

Griffith and Jim Schwartz combined for the win allowing only four hits while striking out eight.

Schwartz was back for a big 3-2 win over the Caterers allowing only

four hits while striking out five.

King opened the scoring in the second with a run only to have the Caterers take the lead 2-1 in the second. King tied it in the third as Don Munro singled as did Schwartz. The two then pulled off a double steal with Taylor hitting Munro in on a sacrifice fly.

King City got the winning run in the sixth as Paul Armstrong tripled and waltzed home on an error.

Then came the loss to Procor who ultimately won the grand championship.

The game was scoreless until the third inning until the victors came up with a two-run homer to decide the issue. King got one back in the fourth on Mark Bernard's homer with Procor getting its final run in the sixth.

A Public Hearing will be held by Planning Committee of the Council of the Town of Markham to consider an amendment to the Official Plan of the Markham Planning Area for Part of Lot 16, Concession 5. The subject property (Ontam Associates Ltd.) comprises some 55 acres, located at the north east corner of 16th Avenue and Warden Avenue as shown on the map below.

The subject lands are presently covered by the Secondary Plan for Devil's Elbow Community (Official Plan Amendment No. 16) which permits development to occur at a maximum density of 2 persons per acre with lots having a minimum area of 2 acres.

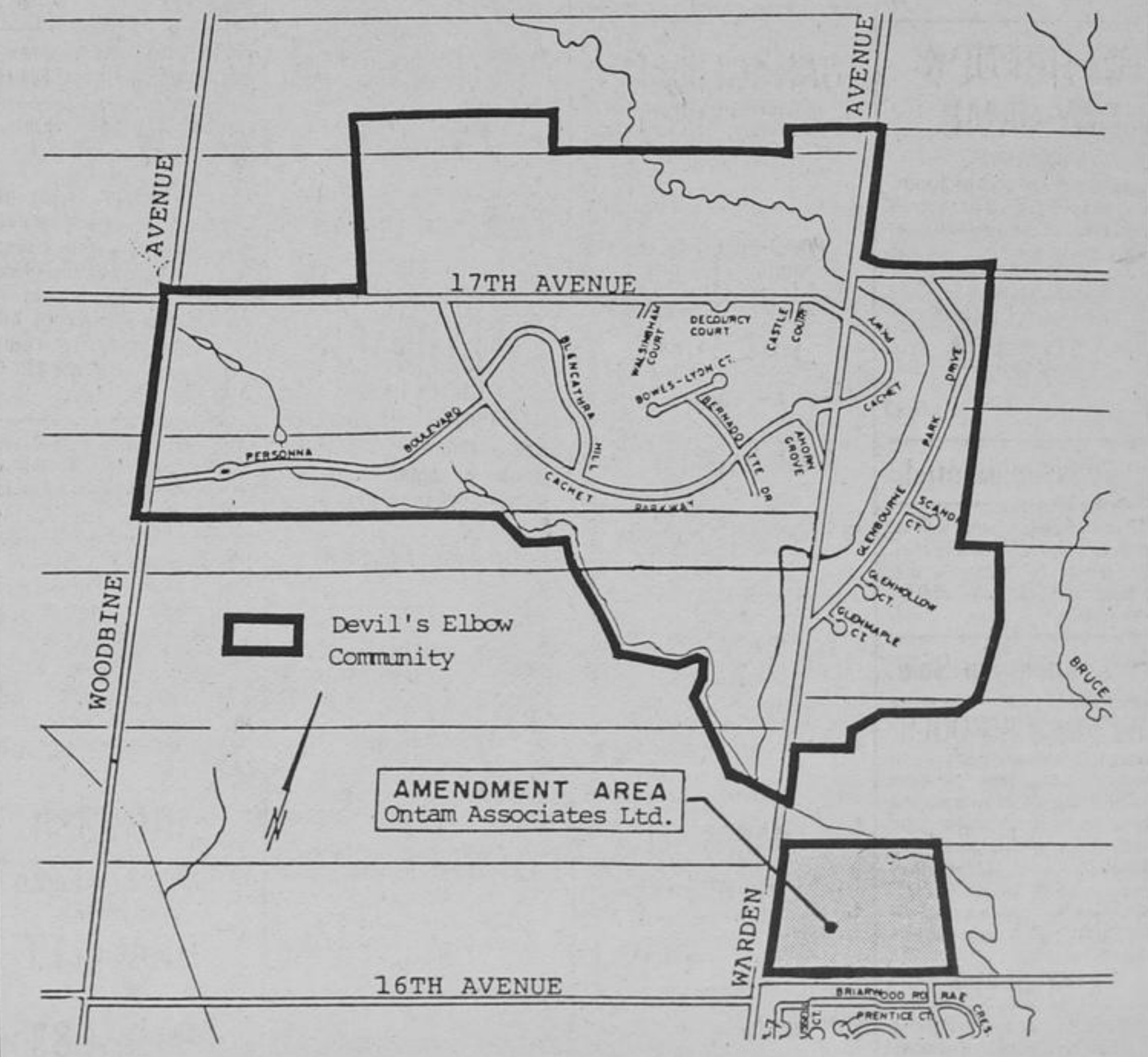
The purpose of this amendment is to permit a proposed plan of subdivision at a density of 4 persons per acre with lots having a minimum area of 1 acre each.

You are invited to attend the Hearing and to state your support or objection to the proposed amendment. The proposed amendment, the Official Plan and existing land use maps may be examined at the Planning Office.
