217th SESSION.

COURT HOUSE, BERLIN, JANUARY 22nd, 1901.

The members of the Municipal Council of the County of Waterloo held their first meeting this day at 2 o'clock in the afternoon as provided by the Municipal Act.

Mr. Herbert J. Bowman, County Clerk in the Chair.

The members being all present excepting Messrs Anthes and Gilholm, and having made and subscribed to the declarations of qualification and of office before the County Clerk, and having been called to order, the election of Warden was proceeded with in the manner following:

1. Moved by Mr Peterson and seconded by Mr. Fischer that Mr. Ferdinand Walter be Warden of this County for the ensuing year.—Carried unanimously.

The Clerk then declared Mr. Walter elected Warden

The Warden elect then in open Council made and subscribed to the declaration of office before the County Clerk.

The Warden then took the chair and addressed the Council thanking the members for unanimously electing him to the position of head of the Council and pointing out the advantage of the rotation system in

securing harmony in the Council throughout the year. The Warden in conclusion referred in fitting terms to the death of the lamented sovereign Queen Victoria, which occurred this day.

The Clerk then read the minutes of the last day of the December Session and the same were adopted.

Moved by Mr. Robson and seconded by Mr. Cherry that a special committee be hereby appointed to draft a suitable resolution of condolence with the Royal Family expressive of the sense of loss sustained by the empire in the death of our beloved sovereign Queen Victoria, and of our continued loyalty to the throne, the Committee to consist of Messrs Plum, Laird, Shaw and the mover.—Carried.

6. Moved by Mr. Plum and seconded by Mr. Hallman that owing to the death of our beloved sovereign, Queen Victoria, this Council now adjourns indefinitely to meet again at the call of the Warden.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Plum and seconded by Mr. Shaw that this Council having adjourned on the 22nd ult. upon the sad intelligence that our late beloved Queen had passed away, take this first opportunity on re-assembling to place on record the profound sorrow of the people of this county and their realization of the Empire's bereavement.

That in grateful remembrance we recall her long and faithful reign devoted to the welfare of her subjects, her life of simplicity and purity that endeared her to the hearts of all people.

That the many signs of sorrow in this, the official centre, as well as in every town and hamlet of the County were sincere evidences of the prevailing sentiment of the people we represent, and were made to emphasize the feelings of those who mourned the death of a sovereign whose love of peace, and whose virtue and goodness will remain an inspiration for the benefit of humanity.

That we regard the noble tribute of respect paid by the esteemed Emperor of Germany to our dead Queen and our Empire, as a most touching and memorable honor to our country, serving as a comfort and solace to our people and tending to bind the two Empires together in a bond of love and sympathy.

That our Gracious Sovereign, King Edward VII, to whom we offer a most fervent loyalty, may exemplify and perpetuate the noble virtues of his illustrious mother is the hope and prayer of this Council.—Carried.

Your Standing Committee on House of Refuge beg leave to report that they have examined and passed bills and claims against the County for the half year ended December 1st, 1901, amounting in all to the sum of \$3,243.27, a detailed list of the claims so passed is attached hereto.

The usual contracts for the supply of bread and meat have been awarded at the following prices for the ensuing half year:

FOR BREAD—At 2½c per lb. for white bread, and 2c per lb. for Graham and rye bread.

FOR MEAT—At 7c per lb. for fore quarter beef, 7c per lb. for hind quarter and 8c per lb. for fresh pork.

Your Committee beg to lay before the Council the 34th Annual Report of the House of Refuge and are pleased to state that the inmates are well cared for and the institution in the best of order, the new Hospital Wing making it complete. It will be noticed that the cost of maintenance per inmate is somewhat larger than last year although it is still considerably less than the average cost of former years. This increase may be accounted for from the fact that the revenue from paying patients entirely ceased, and some of the crops on the farm were not as heavy as usual. At the same time the expenditure has been increased by the purchase of a horse, buggy and harness, a mower, a cream separator and a new pump. Besides ordinary repairs, considerable papering and interior painting has been done. All these causes, together with the fact that the average number in the house was somewhat less than usual, have contributed to increase the cost per capita.

During the year a large new hog stable has been built, also a complete electric light system installed in the House which will be a great convenience and do away with the dangerous coal oil lamps.

This fall the road through the County farm has been graded and partly gravelled. The work was done by farmers under the direction of Philip K. Weber whose services were paid for out of the grant made by your Council. The gravel was to be taken from the County Pit, but only 75 loads could be taken out, the remainder being brought from a pit over a mile away. It is expected that the graveling will be completed next spring.

BY-LAWS

OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE COUNTY OF WATERLOO, 1901.

BY-LAW NO. 506.

To provide for the appointment of certain municipal and other officers, and for other purposes.

Whereas it is expedient and necessary to appoint members of the Board of Audit and to provide for their remuneration.

And whereas it is also necessary to appoint trustees to fill vacancies caused by the annual retirement of Trustees from the Galt Collegiate Institute and Berlin High School Boards.

And whereas it is deemed expedient to appoint representatives from this Council on the Berlin-Waterloo and Galt Hospital Boards for the ensuing year and also to name a director in the Credit Valley Railway Company.

Be it therefore enacted by the Corporation of the County of Waterloo by the Municipal Council thereof in council duly convened and assembled and it is hereby enacted—

That G. M. DeBus of the Town of Berlin, Esquire, a member of this Council, and H. J. Bowman, of the Town of Berlin, Esquire, be and they are hereby appointed as Members of the Board of Audit for the ensuing year, and be it further enacted that the members of the Board of Audit shall each be paid the sum of four dollars per diem for serving on the Board when actually in attendance at the Court House for the auditing of accounts and mileage at the rate of 5 cents per mile necessarily travelled to and from the meetings of the Board.

That George Pattinson, of the Town of Preston, Esquire, be and he is hereby appointed a Trustee of the Galt Collegiate Institute.

That J. G. Reiner, of the Township of Wellesley, Esquire, be and he is hereby appointed a Trustee of the Berlin High School Board.

And be it further enacted that the persons hereinbefore appointed trustees shall hold office for the term of three years ending the 31st day of January, A. D. 1904.

That J. C. Dietrich of the Town of Galt, Esquire, a bona-fide taxpayer and a resident within the Municipality of the County of Waterloo, be and he is hereby appointed and named a director of the Credit Valley Railway Company as the representative of this Municipality for the current year.

That Thomas Shaw of the Town of Hespeler, Esquire and T. S. Shantz of the Township of Waterloo, Esquire, be and they are hereby appointed to represent this Council on the Berlin-Waterloo and Galt Hospital Boards respectively.

BY-LAW NO. 507.

To Authorize the Borrowing of certain Moneys

Whereas it will be necessary to borrow certain sums of money to meet the current expenditure of the County until the taxes are collected for the present year.

Be it therefore enacted by the Corporation of the County of Waterloo

by the Municipal Council thereof in council duly convened and assembled, and it is hereby enacted :—

1. That the Warden and the Treasurer be and they are hereby authorized to borrow money from the Merchants Bank of Canada or from some other chartered bank for the time being having an office in the County Town of said County, from time to time as they may deem necessary to an amount not exceeding in the whole the sum of Twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000) to meet the current expenditure of the said Corporation until such time as the taxes levied therefor can be collected.

2. That the Warden and the Treasurer are hereby authorized and empowered on behalf of the said Corporation and for the purpose aforesaid to sign and execute under the seal of the said Corporation such promissory note or notes as may be necessary and agreed upon between the Warden and Treasurer and the said Bank to secure the repayment of the money so borrowed with interest thereon at the rate of five per cent. per annum, and also to execute in like manner renewals thereof in whole or in part until such advances are fully repaid.

3. That the said promissory note or notes and the renewal or renewals thereof (if any) shall be paid at such date or dates within the current year as may be agreed upon.

4. That any and all sums so borrowed and the interest thereon shall be paid to such bank out of any moneys coming into and being deposited at such Bank in the way and manner directed and authorized by Sec. 4, By-law No. 469.

"To Amend By-law No. 490."

"To Provide for Certain Current and Necessary Expenses, 1901.

Whereas it is expedient and necessary to raise the sum of twenty-seven thousand dollars upon the whole ratable property of the County of Waterloo to defray the expenses in connection with the administration of justice, to make provision for the support and maintenance of the poor, to pay officers' salaries, and for certain current and other necessary expenses for the year 1901.

Be it therefore enacted by the Corporation of the County of Waterloo by the Municipal Council thereof in Council duly convened and assembled, and it is hereby enacted:

That there be raised and levied upon the whole ratable property of the said County the following sums, viz:—

1. For expenses of Municipal Government, five thousand three hundred dollars	\$ 5300
2. For construction works, roads and bridges, one thousand five hundred dollars	1500
3. Repairs to buildings, one thousand dollars	1000
4. For support of House of Refuge, Hospitals and Orphanages, seven thousand five hundred dollars	7500
5. For Administration of Justice, five thousand dollars	5000
6. For School Purposes, High Schools, four thousand two hundred dollars	4200
Public School Examinations, Inspectors' salaries etc.	2000
7. For Interest, five hundred dollars	500

In all amounting to the sum of twenty-seven thousand dollars (27,000) which last mentioned sum shall be raised, levied and collected over and above all expenses by and from all municipalities composing the County of Waterloo in the sum apportioned respectively to each in the schedule following, incorporated with and forming part of this By-Law, the basis upon which said apportionments is made in said schedule being the assessment of the whole ratable property and taxable income of the said County, as the same has been finally equalized under By-Law No. 495 of this Corporation passed the 7th day of June, 1900.

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid that the said sums so to be collected from the several municipalities of this County shall be specified in the Collectors Rolls of such municipalities respectively in Separate columns by the respective clerks, and the same shall be collected and paid by the several municipalities into the hands of the proper officer on or before the 14th day of December now next ensuing.

2. That Schedule A of said By-law No. 157 be amended by inserting after the words "resident of this County" the words "for at least two years last past and has not any contagious or infectious disease."

"To raise the sum of \$10,000 for the purposes therein mentioned and to authorize the issue of debentures therefor."

And whereas the total amount required by "The Municipal Act." to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest is \$703.61.

And whereas the amount of the whole ratable property of the said municipality according to the last revised and equalized assessment rolls is \$23,221,707.00

And whereas the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said municipality is \$27,467.51 no part of which either principal or interest is in arrear.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the said the Corporation of the County of Waterloo enacts as follows:

1. That it shall be lawful for the Warden of the said County to raise by way of loan from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate or politic, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the debentures hereinafter mentioned, a sum of money not exceeding Ten Thousand Dollars, and to cause the same to be paid to the Treasurer of the said Municipality for the purposes aforesaid.

2. That it shall be lawful for the said Warden to cause twenty debentures for the said Municipality to be made for seven hundred and three dollars and sixty-one cents each (being the total sum of combined principal and interest payable annually as aforesaid) and the said debentures shall be sealed with the Corporate Seal of the said Municipality and signed by the Warden and Treasurer thereof.

3. The said Debentures shall be issued and dated on the thirtieth day of December in the present year 1901 and one of such debentures shall be payable on the thirtieth day of December in each succeeding year respectively during the term of twenty years thereafter and the same shall be payable at the office of the treasurer of the said municipality in the Town of Berlin.

4. For the purpose of paying the said debt and interest the said sum of \$703.61 shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of

the said debentures or any of them by a special rate sufficient therefor on all the ratable property in the several municipalities within the said County.

5. This By-Law shall take effect on the day of the passing thereof.

GENTLEMEN:—We beg to report that we have examined the books of account and vouchers of your Treasurer, for the year ending 31st December, 1901, and that we find the same correct and according to the statements herewith submitted.

The security given by your Treasurer for the due performance of his duties, consists of a bond of the London Guarantee and Accident Company, Limited, for the sum of six thousand dollars. The bond is deposited in the Merchants Bank of Canada. It expires on the first day of July next and is renewable from year to year.

The cash balance due by the Treasurer to the County at the date of this audit is one hundred and thirty three dollars and twenty-eight cents, all of which is in the Treasurer's hands.
