

## Building programme announced by Fr. Choate

Construction of a new wing to ease some overcrowding and allow consolidation of current College programmes has been announced by Fr. Norman Choate, C.R., President. Expected to begin in mid 1981, the wing will include eight offices, three classrooms, a meeting room, common room and large assembly hall.


Father Choate points out that this new facility, which will be attached to the present library wing, is not a sign of expansion of academic programmes at St. Jerome's.

For years the popular Family Life and Sex Education programme and, more recently, the Institute for Studies in Learning Disabilities have had to use classroom space on the University of Waterloo campus. The new facility will allow us to "bring some of these existing programmes home." The large assembly hall has been planned with these programmes in mind.

The new wing also will house a Centre for Catholic Experience, now being established, which will address itself to contemporary issues within the Church. The Centre will sponsor renewal programmes and provide a forum where issues of faith and catechetics can be discussed. A lecture series also is anticipated.

Upcoming issues of *Update* will keep you informed as to the progress of the building programme.

# John Theis is new director of Family Life Programme

Dr. John Theis, 44, has been named director of the highly successful Studies in Family Life and Sex Education programme at St. Jerome's.

An assistant professor and long-time Family Life lecturer, he succeeds Dr.

Peter Naus who will become dean of St. Jerome's next July. As director, Dr. Theis will oversee programme growth, plan expansion and continue to secure guest lecturers who are known world-wide for their expertise.

The Family Life programme, consisting of three one-credit courses which study human sexuality and marriage/family relationships, has been given to several thousand educators, social workers and others. It is given during the summer in intensive three-week sessions and as a continuing education course one night a week in the fall and winter.

Dr. Theis has been a member of the St. Jerome's College faculty for the past five years. Prior to that, he taught at the high school level for 10 years, and was in administration at St. Jerome's High School in Kitchener. He holds degrees from the Universities of Western Ontario, Notre Dame and Windsor.

"I am extremely optimistic about the extension of our Family Life and Sex Education programme," said Dr. Theis. "There is a tremendous demand by those who have taken the three courses we presently offer, and I look forward to meeting their needs with the addition of a fourth course this summer."

#### Will Bill 82 attract Summer Students to St. Jerome's College?

The Ontario government has drawn attention to special education recently and, according to Dr. John Orlando of the psychology department, that bodes well for the school's summer Learning Disabilities Institute which he directs.

Bill 82, making special education mandatory in all school boards, was passed by the Ontario legislature in December.

"Attendance at our Institute for Studies in Learning Disabilities by parents, educators, social workers, nurses and others has grown steadily in the past few years," says Dr. Orlando. "Passage of Bill 82 will ensure greater interest as professionals come to St. Jerome's to update themselves in this area."

Dr. Orlando has taught psychology at St. Jerome's for 10 years and, under his direction, the summer Learning Disabilities Institute has grown in size and focus to attract many people from across the province.

In recent years, teachers have been able to identify more easily the need for special education, defined as any form of education outside the ordinary. Increasing provisions are being made across the province to teach the physically handicapped, the emotionally disturbed, and those children with any of a large number of learning disabilities.

To some extent, the bill will formalize some provisions which already have been implemented. "Although this bill is controversial in some areas," Dr. Orlando points out, "one very important aspect is that thousands of children in need of special education will have access to it."

# New Certificate in Catholic Studies established

Dr. Walter J. Bildstein, Director of the College's Christian Living Programme, has announced the establishment of a Certificate in Catholic Studies within that programme.

Requirements for the Certificate are successful completion, with an average grade of 65% or better, of 10 term courses in Religious Studies and Philosophy taught through the College's Christian Living Programme.

Eight of the 10 term courses must be in the area of Catholic theology offered by St. Jerome's College through the Christian Living Programme and the two remaining term courses may be taken from either the Religious Studies or Philosophy courses taught within the Christian Living Programme. Of the 10 term courses, five must be at the 200 level or higher.

This programme provides an integrated package of theology courses within a general or honours degree. Further, many adult students are not interested in pursuing formal degree studies but find attractive a focused package of credit courses leading to a Certificate.

Courses in the Christian Living Programme are an effective forum where traditional faith can be examined, questioned and renewed. In addition, the Certificates will be welcomed by many Ontario separate school boards because they will provide evidence that recipients have had recent post-secondary education in Religious Studies and Christian Living and, therefore, are better prepared to teach in these areas.

"We are happy to announce that this new Certificate will become a permanent part of the Christian Living Programme," said Dr. Bildstein. "The Certificate is a mark of commitment and achievement which will open the way for students to pursue further studies in theology."
