Convocation '84: Summa Cum Laudatory!

The University of Waterloo held its 48th Convocation from May 24 to 26, conferring degrees on over 2,000 students. Among them were over 90 graduates of the University of St. Jerome's College receiving degrees in the faculties of Arts and Mathematics. They join the ranks of our growing alumni family.

For our graduates, their families and friends it was a day of celebration. A concelebrated mass was held in Siegfried Hall in the morning with College President Father Norm Choate as homilist.

Choate reflected on the gifts the new graduates have shared over their time at St. Jerome's, and he spoke of the contribution of parents and friends in making graduation day possible by their moral and often financial support.

He stressed the responsibility of graduates to share their intellectual and material resources with a needy society. "The privileged existence we know in Canada

must be shared with others," he said. "You must use your youthful vision and idealism to work to make society more equitable and just."

A buffet luncheon followed, and at 2:00 p.m. convocation began with an impressive and colourful procession into the Physical Activities Complex. Dean Peter Naus announced the names of St. Jerome's graduands, and College Alumni Director Rob Donelson announced the recipients of the UW Alumni Gold Medals.

The College hosted a wine and cheese reception for graduates and families in the quadrangle following the ceremonies. Each graduate was presented with a ceramic stein embossed with the College crest.

Though an ancient tradition, the 1984 convocation exuded a youthful vigor and newness. The College offers its hearty congratulations to the class of '84!

"Two hundred and nine votes cast by alumni throughout Canada and the United States was very encouraging," says Alumni Affairs Director Rob Donelson. "Considering the fact that this was the College's first concerted effort in decades to form an alumni association, we were pleased with the response. The votes were very close, showing that we had an excellent slate of candidates."

"This first election would not have been as successful had it not been for the generosity of those who let their names stand," says Donelson. "Each candidate displayed that same commitment to the College shown in their student days and have helped us begin the work of laying a strong foundation for our alumni association."

We offer warm thanks to those candidates who did not win but whose active involvement was vital: Peter Visser, Rick Booth, Dave Botts, Paul Ecker, Jim Corrigan, Patricia Predovich and Margo Baird. We will call on their continued involvement in the future.

Donelson noted that 43% of all voters responded to the questionnaire concerning what the priorities and objectives of the alumni association should be. "This information will be carefully considered by the executive committee as they try to draw up a statement of purpose and determine the focus of the association's efforts."

Approximately 60% of all votes cast were from post-1975 graduates. Among them the class of '81 had the highest response rate with 23 votes cast. The classes of '78 and '79 followed with 17 votes each.

The retiring but untiring Father Lavigne

When the new school year begins in September, a familiar voice in the Economics 101 class will no longer be heard lecturing on supply and demand theory and inflationary

After 38 years in high school and university classrooms — 24 of them spent at the University of St. Jerome's College — Father Norbert Lavigne has retired from teaching. He'll stay on as full-time Treasurer of the College, a position he has held in tandem with his teaching duties.

This year also marks another milestone in Father Lavigne's life. He celebrates his 40th anniversary as a priest of the Congregation of the Resurrection. Thousands of students have come under his tutelage during his years at Kitchener's St. Jerome's High School, Scollard Hall in North Bay and here

at the College.

Born in Penetang, Ontario in 1919, Norbert Lavigne moved with his family to Kitchener at the age of nine. His father, Anthony, had worked for a Penetang tanning plant and, when it closed, found work at Breithaupt Tanning in Kitchener. This move was to play a profound influence on his son's

Norbert was educated in the separate school system of Kitchener and was taught on many occasions by members of the Congregation of the Resurrection. In 1938 he entered the Resurrectionist novitiate, went on to St. Peter's Seminary in London in 1939, and was ordained a priest in 1944.


Since the Resurrectionists are primarily a teaching order, it seemed only natural that Father Lavigne would enter the Ontario College of Education for training as a teacher in 1945. For the next four decades the work of a priest-teacher would be the focus of his life.

His first posting was St. Jerome's High School, a place where he felt very much at home. "My family has had a long association with the high school. My brothers studied there and I even taught one of them for a time."

"The first high school course I ever taught was grade ten science," he recalls, "and I had hardly taken a science course in my life! I quickly got into the commercial and business subjects and taught Pitman Shorthand." On top of his teaching duties, Father Lavigne worked in the school's business office and coached basketball.

In 1951 he was moved to another Resurrectionist school, Scollard Hall in North Bay. Business and commercial subjects were again his specialty and he also served as the school's athletic director.

His community had plans for him, and in 1957 Fr. Lavigne left North Bay and spent two years studying Commerce at the University of Ottawa. He received an MBA at the University of Detroit and came to the Univer-



sity of St. Jerome's College in 1960. He taught economics and political science at the Kingsdale campus and served as Director of Residence in his first year as well.

"I have always found teaching to be challenging and I enjoyed the intellectual stimulation," he says.

For a man about to celebrate his 65th birthday, he shows the enthusiasm of a younger man when working with computers. With Fr. David Mowat and others he has been active in a program of computerization at the College.

"My interest started about four years ago when I saw the possible applications in the Business Office," says the chainsmoking, largely self-taught computer enthusiast. "Today all of the College's accounting is handled by a mini-computer.

"We also use a micro-computer which takes over where the mini leaves off. It analyses information and can provide graphics or year-to-year statistical comparisons, for example," he explains.

Father Lavigne is an ardent defender of the use of computers. "People's fear of computers is illusory and those who choose to ignore them do so at their own peril,"

Among his other interests, Father Lavigne is a ham radio operator (call number VE3 GJL). He has used it to maintain regular communications with his community's Bolivian Missions. "It has proven useful both for socializing and for emergencies," he says. "When two of our priests were killed in an air crash over the mountains of Bolivia, I learned of this news by making radio contact with our priests in the region.

"During the Alaskan earthquake of the early 70s, I transmitted messages from radio operators up there to their relatives in this

Now that summer is here, Father Lavigne will be pursuing his other keen hobby, sailing. "I like to sail in the evening and on weekends at our community's cottage on Lake Conestoga. It's a peaceful and relaxing hobby.

In describing his life as a priest, teacher and administrator, Fr. Lavigne says that he has never found it boring. "I still wake up each morning with a full day's work ahead, and there always seems to be more work than hours in the day!"

He may have retired from teaching after nearly four decades, but his ongoing interest in computerization and his willingness to learn new computer skills is anything but retiring.

The alumni executive has agreed to meet again on July 24 in Toronto to further discuss the goals of our alumni association and to plan for the year ahead.



Remi De Roo, Bishop of Victoria, to address College alumni



"Does the Church have a role to play in Canadian life?" This is a question College alumni wil be asked to ponder at a special lecture on Friday evening, October 26.

To address this timely question, one which will be further highlighted by the Papal visit in September, is the well-known and outspoken Bishop of Victoria, Remi De Roo.

"An Evening with Remi De Roo is the first of what we hope will become an annual event for almuni," says Alumni Affairs Director Rob Donelson.

The event will be jointly sponsored by the College Alumni Association and the St. Jerome's Centre for Catholic Experience. It will combine a brief liturgy of the hours, a reception, a dinner and Bishop De Roo's talk. "In this way we hope to promote the spiritual, social and intellectual aims of our alumni association," says Donelson.

Bishop De Roo has served as a member of the Social Affairs Commission of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops from 1973 to 1979 and has been its Chairman since 1980. In this capacity he has gained national prominence as a pastoral bishop with an ardent social conscience. The Bishop's 1983 statement, *Ethical Reflections on the Economic Crisis*, of which De Roo was a major coauthor, called the problems of unemployment and inflation "social evils" and brought them to the forefront of public attention.

De Roo is the former chairperson of the British Columbia Human Rights Commission and serves as President of the Western Conference of Catholic Bishops. He holds a Doctorate in Theology from Angelicum University in Rome. In 1962, at the age of 38, he was ordained as Canada's youngest bishop.

An engaging and thoughtful speaker, St. Jerome's alumni will appreciate his candour and wit. "This will be a unique opportunity for alumni," adds Donelson.

Sabbaticals

In addition to those faculty members on sabbatical leave effective July 1, we welcome back Professors Scott Vanstone, Judith Van Evra and John Theis who are returning from a year of intellectual and scholarly rejuvenation.

Doug Letson of the College's English Department is already busy co-writing, with Centre Director Dr. Michael Higgins, a new book called Portraits of Canadian Catholicism to be published by Griffin House of Toronto in the late Fall. Letson and Higgins have conducted interviews with such prominent Canadian Catholics as Morley Callaghan, Cardinal Carter and Bishop Remi De Roo. Portraits will include chapters on these and nine other individuals representing different professions and whose sense of Catholicism ranges from traditional to very contemporary. An introduction on the history of Catholicism in Canada and a discussion on the evolution of its social impact in the Canadian environment will also be included.

Father David Mowat, C.R., of the College's Mathematics Department will also take a sabbatical leave effective July 1. "I plan to continue my work developing computer aids for visually handicapped students on campus," he says of his years ahead. "There are 22 low-vision students in Engineering alone, so there is a real need for this type of work." Together with UW Professor Peter Ponzo, Fr. Mowat is developing larger letters on computer screens and a computer which actually talks. He will also continue his research into the hardware and software of the new micro-computers being developed today.

Associate professor of Sociology **Dr. Mitsuru Shimpo** will spend his sabbatical leave working under the auspices of the Department of Chief Minister in the Government of Northern Territory, Australia. He plans to study the relationship between the government and the Aborigine settlements, job training for Aborigines and suggestions for improving present programs for natives who are without technical skills. Dr. Shimpo hopes to upgrade his earlier 1977-78 study of Aboriginal school education in Northern Territory.

Father C. Siegfried has retired as the John Orlando of the College's Psychology Department will continue until the end of July as Director of the Institute for Studies in Learning Disabilities. Following this he plans to spend part of his time researching group dynamics at the Concordia University Centre for Social Sciences. He will also be working in a clinical and research capacity updating learning disabilities at the Hawthorne Psychiatric Centre in Northville, Michigan. If there's time, John hopes to spend a month at California's Gestalt Institute in a live-in program of professional upgrading in group dynamics.

College's Supervisor of Maintenance and is being replaced by Father Bill Burns. Father Chris Grabiec, College chaplain since 1980, is pursuing graduate studies in Liturgy at Notre Dame University in Indiana. Replacing him is Toni DeLabbio, a lay chaplain who joins Fr. Alex McCauley on the campus ministry team. Sister Mary Michael at Notre Dame College celebrated her fiftieth anniversary as a School Sister of Notre Dame in early June. New Book by Fogel

College English Professor Stan Fogel will have a new book published in Fall, 1984, by Toronto's ECW Press called *A Tale of Two Countries: Contemporary Fiction in Canada and the United States.* Here's what the critics are saying:

In the narrow world of Canadian literary criticism, references to other literatures have become less and less common. In light of this sad situation, *A Tale of Two Countries* is a welcome relief. This book is a careful study of certain trends in contemporary fiction in the United States and English Canada. The analysis points up interesting differences between the literatures of the two countries.

This book will likely attract a good deal of critical attention – both favourable and unfavourable. The nationalists will find it a denunciation of Canada. The more sensitive critics will discover a new departure in criticism, a frank and provocative study of two cultures that should lead to important new studies of Canadian fiction in its continental context. Among the authors dealt with are Robert Kroetsch, Margaret Atwood, Robertson Davies, William Gass, and Robert Coover.



Professor Ken Fryer dies at 59 - a distinguished teacher, scholar and administrator



One of the early builders of the University of Waterloo's Mathematics Faculty and a dear friend of St. Jerome's College died on May 19 following a long battle with cancer. Professor Kenneth Fryer, 59, Associate Dean of

Mathematics at UW, was regarded by colleagues and students alike as a distinguished teacher, respected scholar and exemplary adminstrator. He is survived by his wife Patricia, four daughters and one son who will register at St. Jerome's in math this fall.

"Ken Fryer was an extremely warm-

hearted man," says colleague Father David Mowat of the College's Math department, "and this came across in the classroom – his students loved him. He had one of those fine minds which was easily understood by those he taught. And in his committee work he always had the good of the University and the good of the students at heart."

Dr. Fryer taught a linear algebra course at St. Jerome's this past year, replacing College professor Scott Vanstone who was on sabbatical leave. His indefatigable spirit was reflected in the fact that he kept on teacing until he was physically unable to do so. "When he lost his voice as a side effect of chemotherapy treatments, only this stopped him from doing the work he loved most – teaching students," says Fr. Mowat. "Yet he remained cheerful throughout."

Fryer was the co-author of ten high school and university mathematics textbooks. He

was widely recognized for his involvement in organizing the nation-wide Mathematics contests for high school and elementary school students.

He was a former president of the Ontario Universities Athletic Association and was an active supporter of athletics at UW. The Fryer Trophy, named in his honour and given to recognize participation in intramurals, was recently retired to St. Jerome's.


Two ball hockey championships are now resting at the College thanks to the B-1
