A Man of Dialogue, Creativity and Commitment:

A Tribute to David Johnston

On October 1, 2010, SJU President David Perrin was seated in the Senate of Canada chamber in Ottawa. Excitement filled the air as the installation of David Johnston as the 28th Governor General of Canada began. "I was full of joy that the individual being installed had been a significant part of the history of St. Jerome's University for over a decade," Perrin says. "What a thrill it was to be present for this historic ceremony."

Perrin remembers the first time he met Johnston. Soon after Perrin's arrival at St. Jerome's in 2007, Johnston, then President of the University of Waterloo, set up a lunch for the two of them, and for an hour and a half these university presidents got to know each other. "He was affable, engaged, and interested



in what I was doing," Perrin says. "He extended intentional support to me on that day and throughout the next three years."

The two met a couple of times each term. Johnston became a mentor, offering genuine friendship and a listening ear and fostering ongoing reflection amid various challenges at SJU. "There could always be dialogue and discussion," Perrin says. "David invites new partners into projects as they evolve, opening them to a range of voices. He loves strategic plans, benchmarks and deliverables, which allow results to be measured and evaluated."

Johnston brings a wealth of experience to the office of Governor General, along with wisdom, creativity, inclusivity, enthusiasm, energy, and the ability to do things in a new way. In his own words, "When we set our sights together, we can do better and inspire each other to achieve great things."

His words sum up the dynamic alliance that exists between St. Jerome's University and uWaterloo. President David Perrin looks forward to building on the strength of that fruitful relationship throughout the years to come.

St. Jerome's Feast The 10th Anniversary

On Saturday, October 2, 2010, St. Jerome's University hosted the 10th anniversary of St. Jerome's Feast, our annual celebration of Catholic university education.

The Honourable Noël A. Kinsella, Speaker of the Senate of Canada, was the featured guest and recipient of the 2010 Chancellor John Sweeney Award for Leadership in Catholic University Education.

This award was created to honour the historical contribution and ongoing commitment of Catholic institutions, leaders and educators to the cause of post-secondary education in Canada. It also recognizes the continuing need for a Catholic presence and voice in shaping future leaders and engaging in the challenging issues facing the world today. The award is named for John Sweeney, who was an exemplary Catholic leader and educator, and the first lay Chancellor of St. Jerome's University.

The Feast was originally scheduled to take place on October 1, but was delayed for one day because of the installation of David Johnston, the former president of the University of Waterloo, as Canada's new Governor General. As Speaker of the Senate, Senator Kinsella, along with the Speaker of the House of Commons,

played a key role in the installation ceremony, witnessing the swearing in of the Governor General as he took the oaths of office.

During The Feast, Senator Kinsella spoke about the importance of Catholic higher education. He reminded us that our namesake, St. Jerome, wrote, "Be ever engaged," and that the education we provide at St. Jerome's prepares our leaders of tomorrow to contribute to the moral or ethical basis of our civilization, "which enables us to properly understand and put into context the ongoing changes in our society."

Senator Kinsella's work as an educator, a scholar and a human rights activist underlines his dedication to Catholic university education for young people today.

The proceeds of this event support first-year entrance scholarships at St. Jerome's University. Among the audience of 115 people were the Hon. Walter McLean and his wife, Barbara; Dr. John English; Dr. Ken McLaughlin; MP Peter Braid; MP Stephen Woodworth; and several other local dignitaries.

Being Green

At St. Jerome's University We Live Our Colours

Green and gold are the colours that represent SJU. Love, Truth and Justice are the gospel values we are committed to. As part of our commitment to justice, we continually strive to "be green".

For over 20 years, St. Jerome's University has proactively lived our mission in ways that limit our daily impact on the environment. Jim Robson, Facility Manager, is looking to formalize this commitment by preparing a sustainability program that can be officially adopted by the University.

One of our earliest initiatives was a composting program. The University of Waterloo's WatGreen Office conducted a "Feasibility Study of Composting at St. Jerome's and St. Paul's" in 1992. Implementation of composting increased waste awareness, which has led to better management of food services and diverted 55 tons of food waste from the landfill stream in 2009.

Three years ago, the conventional cafeteria-style trays were removed from our main cafeteria and replaced with special plateware. As a result, 14,000 gallons of hot water have been saved due to the decreased demand on dishwashing.

Even menu items are chosen so that food requiring similar preparation is grouped together as much as possible. That allows us to take advantage of hot ovens.

The SJU Residence offers students a number of educational programs focused on global warming and personal environmental accountability. The jewel of this program is the "SJU in Peru" service learning opportunity. Each year, arrangements are made for a team of students to visit a fair-trade coffee plantation in Peru, where they are enlightened as to the global impact of their consumer choices. As part of SJU's mandate to promote leadership, this is an exciting opportunity to educate our leaders of tomorrow (read more about this year's trip on page 7).

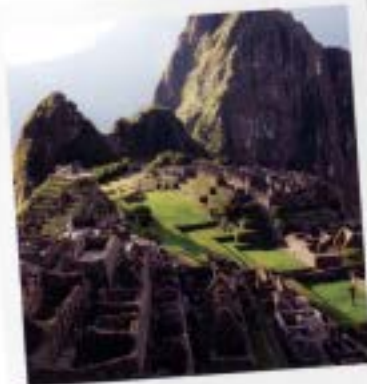

The SJU Students' Union is optimizing electronic communication such as e-mail and Facebook and centralizing messaging, which has resulted in discontinuing paper posters.

Twenty years ago, St. Jerome's initiated a lighting retrofit which took advantage of the latest lighting science. Working it into our regular maintenance program reduced upfront costs and is directly responsible for a 25 per cent reduction in lighting expenses. Being "green" – being environmentally aware and engaged – is "gold": it's good for the environment and it's good for our bottom line.

Experiential Learning in Residence

SJU's mission is to foster leaders who are ready to serve society in a multitude of ways. The residence community at SJU takes this mission to heart by helping to build learning opportunities outside of the classroom.

One of the greatest examples is the SJU in Peru Initiative, which attempts to connect students' actions in residence with the reality of life outside of Canada.

This past June, eight students and two staff travelled to Peru as part of this new program. While there, students spent most of their time with a cooperative of female fair trade coffee growers called Café Feminino. The coffee grown by the cooperative is the same coffee served in the cafeteria at SJU.

By offering residence students the opportunity to travel, work and live in a developing country for two weeks, this program allows students to experience a reality that is not their own—a reality that changes them forever and that they bring back to the residence community in their subsequent years.

SJU Reaches Beyond Borders

Beyond Borders is a program in SJU's Centre for Responsible Citizenship. This three-credit program, which is open to all University of Waterloo students, is designed to help students develop leadership skills for a changing global society, become aware of and concerned about social justice, and gain valuable experience volunteering with development organizations at home and abroad. The program consists of two terms of on-campus course work and one field studies credit.

Beyond Borders started in 2005 in collaboration with Intercordia Canada's international experience program. In 2007–2008, Beyond Borders engaged World University Service of Canada (WUSC) to provide more technical field placements for students who wished to apply their academic training during their placement. In 2009, SJU began a focused effort to create direct relationships with non-profit organizations in the global South that are engaged in any activity related to the United Nations Millennium Development Goals.

In 2010, 11 students participated in this program and had the experience of a lifetime with our established relations partners in Ukraine, India, Peru, Argentina, Uganda, and Kenya. Visit http://www.sju.ca/courses/beyond_borders/BBstudents.html to read about their experiences.

"The Arctic Is a Here, Not a There": Whitney Lackenbauer Keeps Canada's North Centre Stage



SJU History Professor and alumnus Whitney Lackenbauer (BA '98) never stops. He has given more than a dozen presentations on Arctic issues and published two books in 2010: *A Commemorative History of Aboriginal People in the Canadian Military* and *The Canadian Forces and Arctic Sovereignty: Debating Roles, Interests, and Requirements, 1968–1974*. A third book, *Canada and Arctic Sovereignty and Security: Historical Perspectives*, is appearing in November.

While most of us were enjoying the August heat, he was braving fierce winds and freezing temperatures in the high Arctic. His research on Canadian sovereignty and security regularly takes him north, where works with the Canadian Forces and local communities to better understand Canada's sovereignty, security, and stewardship priorities. For northerners, "the Arctic is a here, not a there," Whitney reminds us. Encouraging this mindset nationally, he insists, is pivotal to constructive action that reflects northerners' priorities.

This fall, Whitney has taken his research from the tundra to the corridors of power in Washington, DC, where he is a Fulbright scholar at the School for Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins

University. There he is researching *Sovereignities, Security and Stewardship: Canadian–American Relations and the Arctic*. "Receiving a Fulbright to support international research during my sabbatical year is a tremendous honour that allows me to explore opportunities for Canadian–American partnership in the region," Whitney explains. He has no shortage of opportunities to share his findings across Canada and abroad. The national media frequently interviews him on Arctic issues, and he will deliver keynote addresses this fall to the Northern Economic and Sovereignty Infrastructure Conference in Iqaluit, the Canadian Council for International Law in Ottawa, and the NWT Tourism Conference in Inuvik.

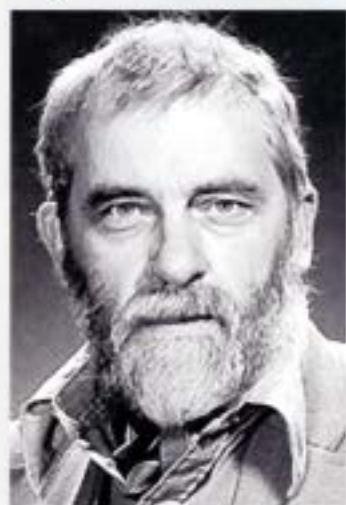
Whitney also acts as an unpaid adviser to the Gwich'in Council International, an indigenous permanent participant at the Arctic Council. He was recently awarded a Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) Research Development Grant to initiate a project on *Cambridge Bay/Ikalukutiak: A Community-Based History* with the Kitikmeot Heritage Society in Nunavut. He is also co-investigator on a new ArcticNet Research grant examining *The Emerging Arctic Security Environment: External and Internal Dimensions*.

Whitney was in town on November 9 to participate in a community event at the Centre for International Governance Innovation: "True North Strong and Free: What Is Canada's Role in the Arctic?" with Brigadier-General Collin J.C., OMM, CD and Serge Bertrand, Captain (Navy).

Whitney hopes his research will give St. Jerome's students who are interested in the north an opportunity to experience the region firsthand. "The beauty of the Arctic does not just lie in the spectacular landscapes, but in the resourceful and fun-loving people," Whitney notes. "I hope that students find the Arctic and their fellow Canadians who live there as inspiring as I do. We have a lot to learn from one another."

Pioneer Faculty Member of St. Jerome's Mourned



Laurence Anthony David Cummings, age 84, died peacefully at home on June 24, 2010, in Houston, Texas, after a valiant struggle with illness. He is survived by his three children, Ann, Elisabeth, and William; his daughter-in-law, Maria; seven grandchildren and their four spouses; and three great-grandchildren. He was pre-deceased by his wife of 59 years,

Jeanne (Duffy), in 2005, and by his grandson Patrick Fleury in 2006.

Larry was drafted out of high school and served in the U.S. Navy from 1944 to 1946. He attended college on the G.I. Bill at Washington University, receiving his B.A. in British and American Literature (1949), M.A. in Renaissance Literature (1952), and Ph.D. in Medieval, Renaissance and American Literature (1960).

In 1961, Larry started teaching at St. Jerome's College, where he stayed for 10 years, serving as English department chair for seven years. From 1962 to 1969, he led St. Aethelwold's Players, an undergraduate group he founded. The players performed medieval plays that he translated, produced, and directed. From 1971 to 1995, he taught at the University of Waterloo in the Department of English and at the School of Architecture.

He received the 1979 Confederation of University Faculty Associations (OCUFA) Teaching Award, "Ontario's highest honour for excellence in university teaching", on nominations by students of English and Architecture from the previous 25 years. He is the author of many research articles, books, reviews, essays, plays, poems, stories, and librettos. He founded, co-founded or was instrumental in the founding of an English department, a provincial faculty association, undergraduate and graduate programs in English, Drama, and Medieval Studies, the School of Architecture at the University of Waterloo, and thereafter its programs

in Cultural History. Upon his retirement in 1995, he received the title of "Distinguished Professor Emeritus".

Dr. Cummings is remembered at St. Jerome's with the Laurence A. Cummings Lecture in Cultural History, which was established by some of his former students. It will be held as part of the SJU Lecture Series in Catholic Experience. This first of these annual lectures will take place in 2011. SJU Professor Recognized for Research in Co-operative Education

Dr. Maureen Drysdale, Professor of Psychology and Sexuality, Marriage & Family Studies, was named the Canadian Association for Co-operative Education's 2009-2010 recipient of the Dr. Graham Branton Research Award. The Award was established to recognize research in Co-operative Education and to encourage such research.



The Award recognizes Dr. Drysdale's significant personal impact in this field and the global work she has encouraged through her active involvement in her research.

Dr. Drysdale was the principal author of the *Research in Co-operative Education and Internships* handbook, which she presented at four different work-integrated learning conferences in 2006 and 2007. In 2007, she published *The Role of Co-op in the Transition from High School to Post-secondary Education*. This publication initiated research involving over 10,000 co-op students. The result concluded that co-op students enjoy better relationships with teachers, have a strong work ethic, and score higher grades and earn more money upon graduation than their non-co-op peers.

Dr. Drysdale has also supervised a student's honour's thesis about co-op education. She has been a reviewer for the *Journal of Cooperative Education and Internships* since 2005, and a member of the editorial board since 2008.

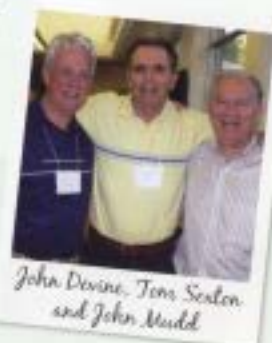
enjoyed the lively presence of these men and their wives who travelled back to Waterloo, primarily from their homes in the United States, to attend this reunion.

"Across the Creek" Alumni Event

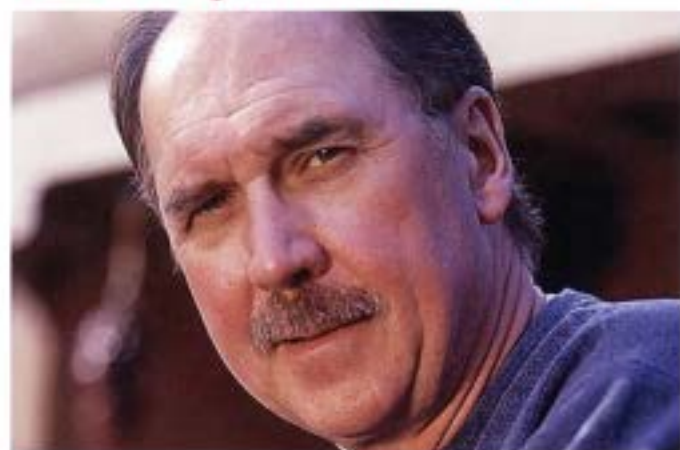

The Fr. Norm Choate Distinguished Graduate Award is presented by the SJU Alumni Association to alumni who have distinguished themselves in professional or community life. SJU Alumni are those who lived in SJU Residence for at least two consecutive terms or who graduated from St. Jerome's. These alumni are the latest three recipients of this award.



Fr. Brian McCormick

attended St. Jerome's from 1958 to 1962. Because he was in the seminary, he didn't officially graduate from St. Jerome's, but we are proud to count someone whom The New York Times described as "a garrulous locomotive of a man who in his

holy war against poverty and hopelessness lets no one off the hook" as one of our alumni. In 1972, he volunteered to go to one of the poorest sections of Trenton, New Jersey, to repair the social damage caused by the riots. He founded Martin House, which has built 161 units of affordable housing and in doing so provided entrance-level construction employment for inner-city men. Martin House serves over 600 people in its Learning Center, which contains a preschool, an after-school safe haven program, and many other youth and education programs. They also offer a transitional housing program that has served over 340 homeless mothers since it began. McCormick has dedicated his life to fighting racism and poverty and bringing hope to the Wilbur Section of Trenton.



Jeff Woodrow (BA '02) is the

founder of Joy Apparel, a custom-made T-Shirt company that encourages people to "Wear the World on Your Heart." Jeff has achieved national and international success and recognition for this unique company, which has been described as a model of responsible

corporate citizenship. Jeff says, "Every face on a Joy T-shirt has been inspired by a real person. When you wear your shirt you are encouraged to think about that person and how your everyday actions can affect others

and the world we live in. It is about taking an active stance against racism and discrimination while being an advocate for peace and equality... because in some way or another, we are all connected!" 5% of the net profit from each T-shirt sold is donated to a different charity every month.



Filomena Tassi (BA '83)

began her career in law. She worked in private practice until 1994. In 2004, she obtained her Master's in Religious Education and was hired as chaplain at Bishop Tonnos High School in Ancaster. As a Trustee with the Hamilton-Wentworth Catholic District

School Board (HWCDSB) in 1991, Filomena established the D.R.E.A.M.S. project, which sends around 200 students a year to the Dominican Republic to live with the poor and work on specific projects. Upon their return, they fundraise to support Catholic Third World missionaries. Filomena also created and implemented the Catholic Leadership Program, a fully integrated five-credit, full-semester high school program offered by the HWCDSB that is based on justice issues, global poverty and working in the Third World. She has also co-authored two books: 500 Prayers (2004) and Greatness In Our Teenagers (2009).
