
### Nadine Collins, University Advancement Officer

This isn't the kind of question you expect to answer in Sexuality, Marriage and Family Studies (SMF) – rather, it's the foundation of the interdisciplinary program offered at St. Jerome's University. Through self-analysis, students are challenged to reflect on their own values and beliefs. They examine their own biases and judgments and critically analyze the foundation of who they are and what they believe. From there, Professors Tracy Penny Light and Toni Serafini believe their students are better able to develop a broader lens with which to approach the world – using critical thinking to interrogate the world around them – and in turn be more inclusive and accepting as they live out their own values. Now that's a powerful approach to understanding the role of sexuality, marriage and family in our community.

Once offered at St. Jerome's University as a flagship summer program to provide Family Life education to teachers within the Catholic school system, SMF Studies has come a long way from its roots. As Dr. Penny Light explains, "The SMF program is now a rigorous academic Honours program." The goal of SMF is to promote interdisciplinary scholarship and research in fields such as gender, maintenance of relationships and the impact

of culture on sexual and family-related values and attitudes. Dr. Serafini reflects that in 2007, the department overhauled its entire curriculum to facilitate an Honours program – and can proudly report that the first Honours class graduated in June 2010. During the analysis of the curriculum and of the program overall, Dr. Serafini and Dr. Penny Light relied heavily on feedback and input from students and from interdisciplinary colleagues to ensure the department was meeting students' needs. To date, SMF is one of the only programs in North America that provides equal treatment of the topics of Sexuality and Family Studies in an Honours or General Major program. The Honours program has a required practicum and a thesis option and includes core research methods and statistics courses.

In Fall 2008, a group of SMF students was awarded a \$12,000 grant from the Arts Endowment Fund to create a documentary film exploring issues of inclusivity to ensure a campus that includes marginalized and underrepresented groups. The student group responsible for the documentary – Jenn Wunder, Laura Madden, Faith Cameletti, Kayla Orr and Alexandra Wendel – hopes that the film will be used as a training and educational tool for first-year students during orientation week. Jenn Wunder describes the BeInclusive Documentary Project as "such an incredible way to learn about our campus environment, and also to apply everything we were learning in the SMF program. It really has been something that exemplifies the notion of research, theory and practice that is emphasized so strongly in SMF, because everything we were learning about our campus would inform what we were learning in our classes and vice versa, and this would also affect how we put this knowledge into practice."

Putting knowledge into practice became a formalized aspect of the SMF program in 2009. Since then, over thirty-five students have been involved in four or eight-month practicum placements at a variety of local community organizations, such as Early Years centres, sexual health and education services, agencies and shelters servicing homeless youth, counseling services and


community outreach.
Students in SMF must
also complete ePortfolios
(electronic portfolios)
as a tool to capture
their historical learning
through the program and
reflect on the connection
between research and
theoretical learning – in
essence, demonstrating
what they've learned
and how the world
around them has been

impacted. Through both the practicum placements and the ePortfolios, students use critical analysis and integrate the knowledge and experiences obtained during the SMF undergraduate degree, with a view to transferring this learning to work or educational pursuits beyond graduation as leaders within their communities.

Over the past few years, interest in the SMF program of study has been on the rise. This might be in part because the SMF professors link their own research to SMF, creating more awareness about the program and the learning approach. Dr. Penny Light was recently recognized for her co-authorship of a successful Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) grant application, Gender and Health: Histories. In 2008, she published an article entitled "Making Connections: Developing Students' Historical Thinking with Electronic Portfolios."

She was also featured in February on CTVs ProvinceWide as an expert in dating and relationships. Dr. Serafini, meanwhile, published "The Functions of Identity Scale: Validation in Italian Late Adolescents and Emerging Adults" in 2010, and recently co-authored an article "Undergraduate Students Identify What Fosters Critical Self-reflection in Higher Learning", in an edited volume on Canadian scholarship of teaching and learning, with fellow SMF Adjunct Professor, Carm De Santis. She is also working on co-authoring a book on current issues in adolescence and working on an interactive website project about sexuality, relationships, and social issues concerning adolescents and their families.

Coming up in the year ahead, for the first time, the Florence Fleming Award will be given to an upper-year student in Sexuality, Marriage and Family Studies. The award was created by SJU student Ted Fleming in

memory of his grandmother, Florence Fleming, who strongly supported post-secondary education, particularly for women and for sex education.

As the SMF program continues to grow, it's important to see how it fits within the tradition and vision of St. Jerome's University. Dr. Penny Light explains, "It all comes back to the very concept of social justice and empowering students with the knowledge, compassion and leadership skills to impact and change the world around them. The SMF program is all about inclusivity, being accepting of others, practicing ethical behaviour and fostering sensitivity — and that's all about SJU's commitment to learning and academic excellence through the gospel values of love, truth and justice, and the formation of leaders for the service of the community and the Church."

### Being Green

### It IS easy being Green

There is a lot of hype and education out there about reducing energy consumption. Implementing more cost-savings techniques and introducing energy-saving programs and educational resources have become more important to SJU than ever. Facility Manager Jim Robson is working towards realizing a Sustainability Program at SJU to minimize our environmental footprint. The Sustainability Program focuses on three key areas: reduction of energy consumption, waste reduction, and natural regeneration.

SJU Facilities is developing an aggressive threeyear plan that will measure and ultimately reduce our kilowatt consumption through promoting energy conservation. The plan will be designed with input from our energy provider, Waterloo North Hydro, and will be implemented at SJU with plenty of education and awareness-raising about the role all students, staff and faculty will play in reducing our carbon footprint.

Despite the many recycling bins around campus, large amounts of paper and metal are still making their way to local landfill sites. Facilities will complete a "waste audit"



in August to find out how waste is being managed and whether more can be done to encourage recycling and reduce the impact on landfills.

To lessen our impact on the environment, a "no mow" or natural regeneration area will be set aside in July to reduce the amount of grass that needs to be cut on campus. The naturalized area will support plant species that represent those that would have been found on campus prior to human settlement.

### Dr. Kieran Bonner on Power, Parenting and the Human Condition



### An Evening with David Morrell

Recipient of the 2011 Distinguished Alumni Award

Despite the chilly January temperatures, Dr. David Morrell (BA '66) joined alumni and friends at St. Jerome's for a wonderful evening of sharing stories of SIU in the 1960s and in celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the University of Waterloo's English department. He inspired the audience with anecdotes of his career as an award-winning author of more than 30 books and reflected fondly on his beginnings as an SJU English graduate in 1966. His message was simple - the St. Jerome's community provided a solid foundation for his career. His academic studies with professors such as Dr. Laurence Cummings and his friendship with fellow English student Robert Wiljer (BA '66) (who turned up to see him at the event), gave him the support he needed during his time at St. Jerome's. It was great to hear Dr. Morrell's enthusiasm and fond reflections about his time on campus.

In his line of work, research is key to strong and accurate plot and character development. He is trained in wilderness survival, hostage negotiation, assuming identities, and defensive driving. All of this research goes into the writing of his bestselling books. His first novel, First Blood, featured the character John Rambo, which spawned the movie Rambo, starring Sylvester Stallone. There are 18 million copies of his work in print, and his books have been translated into 26 languages. No small feat for the Kitchener-born writer.



He is a three-time recipient of the coveted Bram Stoker Award. During the SJU event, he received another honour: the Fr. Norm Choate 2011 Distinguished Alumni Award. This award recognizes the contributions Dr. Morrell has made to the literary world, with action thrillers such as The Naked Edge, Creepers, and The Spy Who Came for Christmas, as well as his achievements in community life.

Dr. David Morell now lives in New Mexico with his wife, Donna (BA '65) – a fellow SJU grad.



#### Michele Mosca


Faculty member Michele Mosca (BMath '95) has been named one of the country's Top 40 Under

40. The award, announced in The Globe and Mail (April), recognizes the achievements of 40 young Canadians whose vision, innovation and leadership is making a positive difference in their communities across Canada. Mosca is recognized for his outstanding contributions to science as a professor of quantum physics at the University of Waterloo. He graduated from SJU in 1995 with a mathematics degree.

As one of the founding leaders of Waterloo's Institute for Quantum Computing, and a founding researcher at the Perimeter Institute for Theoretical Physics, Mosca has played a key role in placing Waterloo and Canada at the forefront of research and innovation. 
helping to implement the Turning Point program while principal at Valley Heights Secondary School in 2006.
