It is understood that Premier Druy will pay a visit here in the course of the next week or so.

A Girls Baseball match will be one of the features at the Big Day of Sports, May 24th.

The new incinerator for the joint use of Timmins and Tisdale was taken over last week as completed and is in active use now giving perfect satisfaction.

There is to be a meeting of the Timmins Baseball Association in the Council Chamber on Thursday evening of this week at 8 o'clock. All baseball fans should make a special note of this meeting to-morrow evening.

The many friends of Mr. A. Farragher will be pleased to learn that he is making excellent progress to recovery from the injuries received in the recent blasting accident. The Hollinger sent him to Toronto General Hospital for treatment there by specialists, and word from Toronto is to the effect that he is making the best of progress to complete recovery.

"Happy" Woods, champion speed swimmer of Northern Ontario, will compete at the sports in Haileybury this summer, and go to Toronto for the race across the Bay in the wind-up of the season.

No trace has yet been secured of the two men who recently escaped from North Bay jail. One was being held on a charge of murder and the other on a more evil charge, the rape of a 9-year-old child in Timmins. The authorities are making every effort to capture the escaped men but so far without noticeable results.

A Grand Masquerade Ball is being held this (Wednesday) evening in King's Hall. There will be prizes for the best costumes, lady and gentleman, and for the best comies, lady and gentleman. Al. Wilson's orchestra in full masquerade costume will furnish the music.

Mr. W. Field, president of the Timmins Amateur Athletic Association, has received a communication from Iroquois Falls in regard to district baseball for the season. Iroquois Falls asks if Timmins this year will have a Senior and a Junior Baseball Team with amateur cards for all players. This is the idea under which baseball is being organized at the Falls this year. It is recognized that this year baseball must be kept on a strictly amateur basis or all connected with it will lose amateur privileges not only in baseball but in all other sports as well, hockey included. Those at the head of amateur sport throughout the Dominion are making a special point this year of seeing that all rules are observed. Iroquois Falls wants amateur sport and apparently is desirous of doing everything to uphold the general regulations. In Timmins, the general opinion seems to be along the same line. There is enough baseball talent in the town and camp to assure a good season of amateur sport, and interest and enthusiasm are increasing in baseball from day to day. President Hopleston has communicated with the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada with a view to securing the necessary amateur cards for all players here. In Timmins alone there will be about 50 amateur cards necessary at the start and others may be found necessary as talent comes to the front. "There are too good baseball teams already under way at the Hollinger," says one baseball fan who explains that the University boys have a crack team of their own not to mention the other baseball talent at the big mine.

THURSDAY AN EASY DAY AT TIMMINS POLICE COURT

Thursday last week was a comparatively easy day at the Timmins Police Court, the cases before Magistrate Atkinson being neither numerous nor very important. The Magistrate, nevertheless, did not have an easy week-end in the Camp, there being a number of bigger cases at the South End court, where thousand dollar fines for breaking the O.T.A. were among the orders of the day.

At Timmins court, Joe Maravitch, for teaming without a license, was touched for \$5.00 and costs. J. Boilard for being drunk and destroying property in the Lunch Car had to hand over about \$30.00. On the drunk charge he was fined \$20.00 and costs, the damages he had to pay for damage done by him in the Lunch Car made another \$6.00.

Mike Traache had charged Mike Moscovick and Fred, Ababuek with assaulting him, but these cases were withdrawn.

Joe McCusson and Mike Roscoe each paid the usual ten and costs for being intoxicated in a public place.

A charge of assault against Geo. Gauthier was withdrawn.
