crease in the cost of production.

Mr. Frank desired to be shown xact figures as to whether or not the nanufacturers would sell the mines at the same price they do to wholesalers.

Mr. Frank stated that in 1917 he got \$4.92 per day and paid \$1.00 per day for board. Now he gets \$4.00 | per day and pays \$1.25 per day for board. Room rent has been raised from \$5.00 to \$7.50. He got \$32.75 for a half month, having worked every shift as solution man He thought solution men's pay should be \$4.50 per day as they could easily earn their pay. He pointed out that at the Dome he is now going in the hole 27 cents per day and that he thinks the wages should be increased 50 cents per day as this would bring up efficiency and make the dollar bill grow larger.

Mr. DePencier stated that the old rate to solution men included a bonus of 50 cents for crowding forty thou sand odd tons through the mill per month. This was not the situation at present and further stated that the board rate had been cut down from \$7.50 to 5.00.

Mr. Frank then stated that Dome board and room costs \$42.50 per month. Ordinary Timmins rates are \$8.00 he said.

Mr. Frank said that \$65.00 per month was not enough for solution men and cited cost of clothes at \$60.00 per suit. He has to pay \$100.00 for 2,000.00 20-pay life insurance. He also stated that in eyanide solution a pair of shoes will only last about two months.

Mr. Perrault spoke as a married man who has worked at the Hollinger for five years. He had to move into a smaller house at 10.00 per month and has to cut his own wood. About one and a half to two years ago he could save a dollar or two. This saving is now almost exhausted as a married man has more sickness bills than a single man. He said to-day he can make both ends meet; he lives comfortably and gets good quality

Mr. Brigham then stated that the Hollinger would engage to institute a sickness insurance for employees, the cost of same to be borne by the Company, the men to get half pay when laid up. He thought the other mines would do the same thing. The Hollinger Board of Directors considered the matter recently and are agreeable.

Mr. Brigham said the working man would get half pay while sick and he thought the only other solution he could offer at this meeting was the opening up of a company store.

Mr. Frank stated that increased production would decrease costs; tha the way to solve the situation was to increase wages and this would attract workers to the district.

In responce to Mr. Webb, Mr. Ennis stated the McIntyre would start a stere on August 1st and Mr. Brigham said the McIntyre would not beat
