Pupils Did Unusually Well in Promotions This June. In Some Classes All the Pupils Passed. In the Promotion Lists Pupils Divided Into Four Grades.

Promotion and Grading Lists for the school year ending June 30th, 1925.

In the Promotion Lists the pupils are divided into four grades:—

A.—Pupils who have been promoted on their work for the year and who have taken honours at least seven months out of the nine on which the results are based. This is the best class of pupils in the schools.

B.—Pupils who have been promoted in their work for the year but who have been on the Honour Roll fewer than seven times out of nine.

C.—Pupils who had to try the written examinations and have passed with honours.

D.—Pupils who have passed on the written examinations but have not taken honours.

Pupils who have failed may have their cases considered on the re-opening of school in September.

The Grading Lists for the junior classes give the names of the eight best pupils in the room in order of merit.

In the promotion lists the names are arranged alphabetically and not in order of merit.

TIMMINS WINS FIRST ROUND IN ONTARIO CUP

First Time in Three Years That Timmins Has Won From Kirkland at Kirkland Lake.

The Ontario Cup match between Timmins and Kirkland Lake on Saturday last at Kirkland Lake was good value for anybody's money. It was a swift, clean game, with Timmins coming out on top with the score 2 to 0. This is the first time in three years that Timmins has won from Kirkland Lake at Kirkland Lake, the best possible in the last few years being a draw.

Saturday, Timmins lost the toss and Kirkland set them kicking uphill and against the sun. The first half was perhaps in favour of Kirkland Lake, but the Timmins defence stood solid and unbeatable. In the second half the Kirkland team cracked, the pace apparently having been too hard for them. A Cadman had a dandy shot on goal, and the only way Kirkland could save was by one of the players fisting the ball. This caused a penalty, and from this penalty Satrang sent in a beauty for the first counter for Timmins. The second goal for Timmins was another by Satrang from a good pass by A. Cadman. Timmins-Porcupine Road To Be Open July 1, 2 and 3

ALL CHARGES DISMISSED AGAINST CHENETTE BROS.

Without Calling on the Defence Judge Dismissed Charges.

At Cochrane last week Judge Caron dismissed the charges against Jas. and Fred. Chenette of South Porcupine, without calling on the defence. There were three charges against each of the men, who are taxi drivers, and who were charged with living in whole or in part on the proceeds of immorality. A young woman, now serving a term for prostitution, gave evidence to the effect that the men had arranged with her to split fifty-fifty on the proceeds of immorality. She also said that the accused men had arranged for her to visit certain Chinamen for immoral purposes. Two Chinamen from Timmins corroborated this part of the girl's evidence. The Judge took the attitude that the woman's evidence was not very dependable, in view of her character and admissions, and that the Chinamen also need not be too closely considered. The woman also admitted bad conduct previous to her acquaintance with the accused. Accordingly, Judge dismissed the charges without the defence putting in evidence. Mr. R. M. Myers acted for the Crown and Mr. M. G. Hunt, of Kirkland Lake, for the accused.

Capt. and Mrs. Cornthwaite have been very popular and highly regarded here and their departure from town is very sincerely regretted as a distinct loss to the community. Capt. and Mrs. Cornthwaite leave here on Thursday for New Liskeard.

The new officers to be stationed here will be Adjutant and Mrs. Crowe, who have recently been at New Liskeard, and who are highly regarded there. There will be special welcome services for them here on Thursday evening of this week.

WOMAN PRISONER DIES WHILE WAITING TRIAL

Mrs. L. Maki, Held on Serious Charge, Passes Away. Inquest to be Held.

Mrs. L. Maki, who was held in jail here on charges of selling liquor and of keeping a common bawdy house, died on Wednesday morning last. The charges were laid some weeks ago but the woman had been out on \$2000.00 bail, securing remands from week to week, one side or the other not being ready to proceed. On June 17th, the prosecution was ready to proceed with the cases against L. Maki, and Mrs. Maki. Maki was convicted on charges of selling liquor and of living on the avails of prostitution, being fined \$500.00 on the first count and sentenced to six months in jail on the second charge. The four operators from the Toronto detective agency were here and gave evidence in the cases against Maki and Mrs. Maki. A medical certificate was presented to prove that Mrs. Maki was too ill to appear in court. The man who had provided the bail for Mrs. Maki asked to be relieved of the bail. A second doctor was sent to examine the woman, and reported to the Magistrate that Mrs. Maki was not as ill as she professed to be and that she was not too ill to appear. Accordingly she was brought to the court, and after the case, no bail being available, she was taken down to the cells. For a day or two she did not appear to be particularly ill, but was kept under medical attention. Tuesday evening she seemed to have reached a state where a nurse was necessary, and so a nurse was engaged. When the nurse left in the morning, Mrs. Maki seemed to be in good condition again. Wednesday morning at about 9.30 Dr. McInnis paid a professional visit to the woman, and while he was attending her she suddenly collapsed, dying in a minute or so. Death appeared to be due to heart disease. A postmortem was held last week and an inquest will be held Wednesday evening of this week.

NEW MOTOR FIRE TRUCK ARRIVED HERE THIS WEEK

The new motor fire truck, under order for some time past, reached Timmins this week and had its first appearance on street on Tuesday morning, looking especially fine and up-to-date. Mr. Morris Daher is the driver of the truck. It is likely that the new truck will run out to South Porcupine for the Firemen's Tournament on July 1st.

The next regular meeting of the Town Council will be held on Monday afternoon, July 13th, commencing at 4 p.m.

Several Other Main Blocks To be Paved This Summer

Pavement to be Put in on Spruce Street and Cedar Street From Fourth to Second Avenues; Third Avenue From Birch to Elm Street; Fourth Avenue From Pine to Cedar Street. Also Storm Sewer to be Installed.

As will be seen from the notice elsewhere in this issue, the Town intends to construct several more stretches of paved road on the main blocks of the Town. These are to be constructed on the Local Improvement Plan. The estimated cost is \$55,074.00, of which the Corporation's share will be \$29,316.60. The work is to be paid in fifteen annual instalments. The new pavements to be put down are as follows:—On Third Avenue, from Birch Street to Elm

Street; on Fourth Avenue, from Pine Street to Cedar Street; on Spruce Street from Fourth Avenue to Second Avenue; on Cedar Street, from Fourth Avenue to Second.

Storm sewers are to be constructed:—on Second Avenue, from Birch Street to Spruce Street; on Cedar Street from Fourth Avenue to Second Avenue. The estimated cost of the storm sewers is to be borne by the Town at large.
