SEVERAL CHANGES ON TIMMINS POLICE FORCE

There have been several recent changes on the Timmins Police Force. Chief Pascoe is now in harness, and has a private office upstairs in the town hall building, the downstairs police office being reserved for the use of the constables only.

Last week the resignation of Deputy Chief W. McCord was accepted by the Council to take effect forthwith. Mr. McCord accordingly completed his services on the force last Thursday. His resignation was put in to take effect on May 20th, a month from the date of tendering, and Council allowed his salary to that date, while freeing him from duty last week. Mr. McCord was a capable and popular officer and good citizens generally will regret his departure from the force.
