RINK WILL BE AVAILABLE FOR MARKET PURPOSES

Market Will Likely be Opened as Soon as Farmers and Gardeners Are Ready to Supply the Demand.

For several years past Timmins Market each summer has been a benefit alike to producers and consumers. From all standpoints the Market has been a helpful success. This year The Advance understands that the Hollinger is again willing to give the use of the Skating Rink for Market purposes as in past years. There was a feeling last year that the market was opened too early in the season, perhaps. This year the idea is to leave off the opening until the farmers and gardeners have their produce ready for the market. Councilor J. H. Bacon, under whose direction the market has been so useful and successful in past years, is of the opinion that it would be as well to leave off opening for a few weeks, so that when the market does open there will be lots of produce available and the market accordingly will be successful right from the start. The Advance has had a large number of enquiries as to when the market will open this year. The date of opening will be announced later. The opening will likely be in August.

SPELL OF WARM WEATHER NEEDED FOR THE CROPS

Farmers and others in the district say that a good spell of warm weather is necessary now for the best success of the crops in this immediate district. The crops are promising well this season. It looked for a time as if the hay crop would be light but since the recent generous rains, hay looks as if it would be as good or better than ordinary. With anything like favourable weather the consensus of opinion seems to be that the crops will be good this year. Of course the season is short but in this country it does not take long to grow great crops.

YOUNG BOYS SHOULD NOT BE DRIVING AUTOMOBILES

Recently a number of young boys and some girls have been noted in town driving motor cars. In one case report has been made of a boy about thirteen or fourteen driving a motor truck. The practice of boys and girls driving motor cars should not be permitted. Traffic in town is now too heavy to allow any but matured and skilled drivers. Under the very best conditions the increased traffic in town gives rise to considerable risk and danger to the public in general. This risk should not be increased to the proportions of a general menace by permitting immature drivers to endanger themselves and others. "No young boy or girl drivers" would appear to be a good rule both for the sake of the boys and girls themselves and for the safety of the general public.

CHANGE IN REGULATIONS FOR PLANT REGISTRATION

At a meeting of the Plant Registration Committee of the Canadian Horticultural Council, held recently in Ottawa, a slight modification in the regulations governing registration was made. Instead of issuing a certificate of record when a new plant was accepted for recording no certificate will in future be issued until the plant is fully registered. It has been provided, however, that the Council, upon the recommendation of any recognized horticultural organization, will grant an award of merit certificate to any plant recorded at the Plant Registration Bureau.

Full details of the method of recording a new plant and of the operation of the plant Registration Bureau in respect to registration can be obtained on application to the Secretary of the Canadian Horticultural Council at Ottawa.

MAKING PROGRESS ON TRUNK ROAD OF NORTH

Automobiles Have Already Made Trip to Porcupine From Cobalt, It is Said.

Good progress continues to be made in the work of building the various links to make a continuous roadway from North Bay to Cochrane, Iroquois Falls and Timmins. While the long stretch of roadway is often referred to as the "highway," this name is rather misleading in view of the "highways" down south, where "highways" are paved or concrete or other smooth and permanent construction. However the northern "highway," though chiefly of the type of the country road will be a great convenience and asset when completed. It will connect the settled north with all the south and give the south full access by motor to this North Land.

While the roadway will not be completed all the way between North Bay and the North by the end of this year as expected two years ago, the work is going along nicely now. One after another the "missing links" in the stretch of roadway are being built and connected. Already two or three automobiles have made the trip from Cochrane to Timmins, though there are a bad spot or two still left. Good progress is also being made between Porcupine Junction and Cobalt where there are several strips of road to be finished before the "highway" will be a through one. Northern Development Department men are engaged at present burning and stumping on the section between Ramore and Seseekina.

In the southern section there is also progress being made. An automobile last week made a new record for the distance travelled by auto south of Cobalt, getting as far as Owaissa, which is about 7 miles south of Temagami.

Good speed has been shown on the new contract for the section of the roadway south of Temagami. The contract was recently awarded to Angus and Taylor for a fifteen-mile stretch. Three work trains of 22 cars each are making five trips a day hauling filling-in material for the roadbed which is planned to go along the west side of the T. & N.O. tracks.

The game was delayed half an hour owing to the non-appearance of the referee. It was then agreed by mutual consent of both teams to have Mr. Wallace act as referee, and the game commenced at 6:45 p.m. Dome won the toss and Peterson kicked off for Timmins in a drizzle of rain. Play was very even, both goals being visited in turn. Peterson broke through the Dome defence, his parting shot striking the inside of the upright for what looked like a goal. Dome broke away but could make nothing of the Timmins defence.

Play was then centred around mid-field, and half-time arrived without either team having found the target. Half-time: Dome, 0; Timmins, 0.

The opening exchanges of the second half saw the Dome on the defensive, but the ball was kicked clear. Dome broke away but the Timmins defence was giving nothing away, and their forwards paid another visit to Parker. Dome paid another visit to Elrick and from a bit of loose play in front of goal Fideok scored. A few minutes later Dome were awarded a foul against Liddell for what seemed to be a fair shoulder charge. A. Harrower took the kick from the 18 yards line and drove the ball into the corner of the net. From the kick-off Timmins attacked but Dome were now playing a winning game and were not to be caught napping. Dome once more broke away and were awarded a penalty for Cooper fouling Richmond. Richmond took the kick himself and scored.

The game was very exciting from the Dome viewpoint, and it occasioned quite a surprise to the Dome supporters when Richmond had the ball lifted from his toe by Elrick, when he had only the goalkeeper to beat. Soon after the game ended.
