SHOW THIS TO THE GOOD HOUSEWIFE SOME TIME

(Vankleek Hill Review)

How many hostesses, to put at ease a guest who has accidentally dropped cigar or cigarette ash on the carpet, have said—"Never mind! A little ask will not hurt the carpet!" Though they may not realise it, this is the truth. Actually, ash is good for carpets.

In the first place, ash keeps away moths. Then it helps to keep a carpet dry—this is important, because damp spells disaster to a carpet. The ash picks up the damp by absorbing it. Test a piece of material, moistened with a drop of water, and you will see this is true. Again, tobacco ash picks up the dirt, and thus, instead of being rubbed into the carpet and soiling it, the dirt is held in the ash, and can quite easily be brushed up or shaken out.

An Eastern custom, when carpets have to be stored, is to dress them liberally with ash.

Of course, glowing ash must not be dropped!

BIG FIGURE GIVEN FOR ART WORK AT GIVEN RECENTLY

Fingers snapped and the bids jumped up last week in Manhattan's American Art Association-Anderson Galleries until the auctioneer's ivory hammer knocked down a 15th Century portrait bust of a Princess of Aragon by Francesco Laurana to Lord Duveen of Millbank, for \$102,500. It was the highest price paid at an art auction in New York since depression, high water mark in the three-day sale of the heterogeneous art collection of shrewd old Thomas Fortune Ryan. Relatives, collectors, and many of the original dealers from whom he bought them bid up the rest of the etchings, picture books, Persian rugs, Gothic and Renaissance bronzes and marbles, Etruscan urns and other pomps and gauds assembled in the financier's long acquisitive life for a total of \$409,354.
