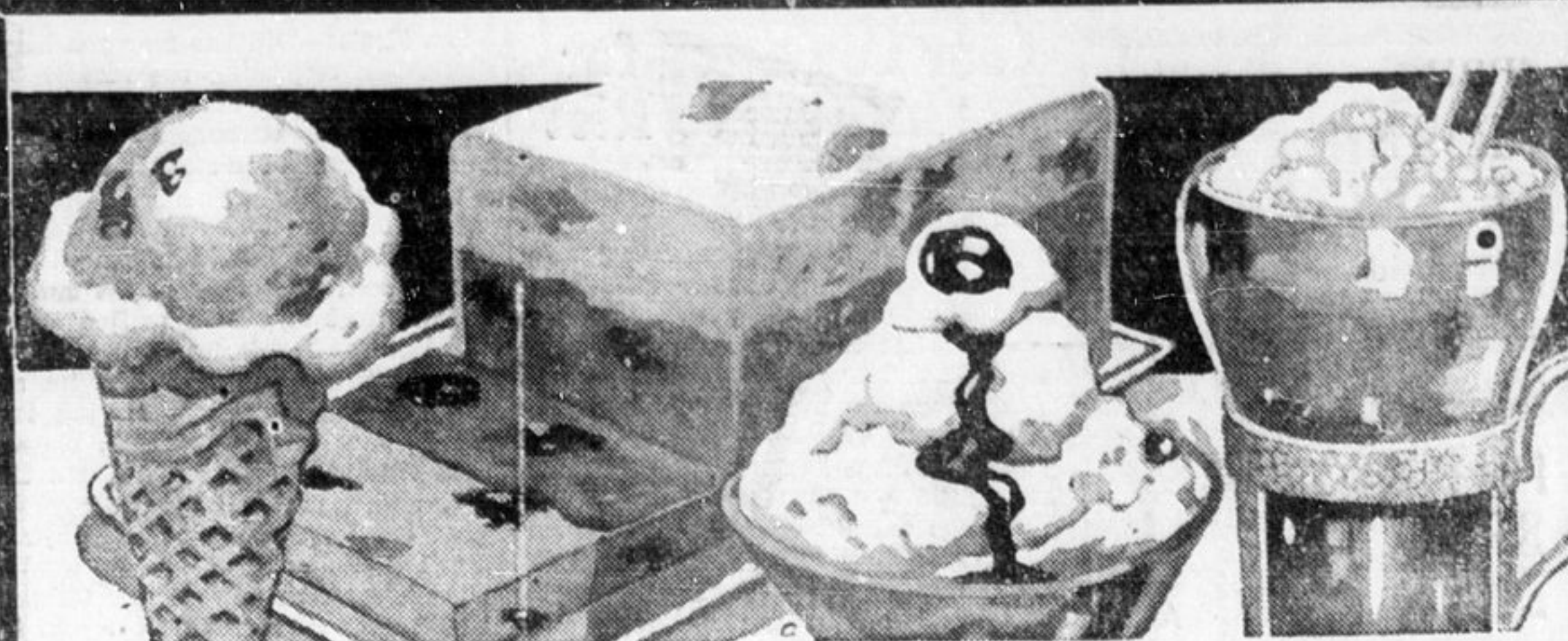
Meeting of Officers of Legion Zone on July 17th
