## Said he Used Car to Try and Take His Life

Kirkland Lake Man Faces Charges After Wild Ride.

(From Tuesday's Northern News)

Arrested after the motor car he had allegedly stolen turned over on the highway at Chaput-Hughes after being pursued by a Northern News writer, Robert Castonguay, aged 26, will face a charge of drunk while driving when he appears in police court here on Thursday.

The accident happened early Saturday morning and the vehicle was badly smashed, landing on its wooden top, but the accused escaped injury—as a matter of fact he didn't even bear a scratch.

The Northern News reporter noticed the car weaving along Government Road at a high speed and followed in a taxi. For about two miles the car driven by Castonguay zig-zagged along the highway at a speed of about 50 miles an hour.

About the middle of Chaput-Hughes just fifty feet ahead of the pursuing car, the automobile partially slid into the ditch on the south side of the road, grazing a telephone post and knocking off a bumper and a license plate.

Careening off the post, the Castonguay vehicle lurched over to the right hand of the road and ran halfway up

a rock ramp before falling on to the highway, top first, accompanied by a shower of sparks.

The reporter and the taxi driver jumped from their car and hurried to the smashed sedan. Yanking the front door open, they expected to find the driver badly injured, but upon pulling him from the twisted interior of the vehicle, he was miraculously all right.

Sobbing on the shoulder of the reporter and apparently under the influence of liquor, Castonguay said that his wife had left him and that he wanted to kill himself. He later repeated the statements to the police.

In the police station, Castonguay admitted that he had stolen the car and that he had drunk a considerable quantity of beer. He pleaded with the

officers to "shoot or hang him or anything."

The owner of the car which Castonguay admitted stealing was Severe Guy of 11 Main street. As he was willing to "forget the whole business" if Castonguay would pay for the damages, a charge of stealing a car was not laid against the accused.

A conviction for "drunk while driving" does not carry the option of a fine, Chief of Police W. Shane informed the News.

## Thirty Days in Jail for Snatching Money

costs or ten days when he was found guilty on a charge of reckless driving.

Gilbert Parker said that he was coming from work and as he made a left-hand turn off Pine street onto Fourth avenue the accused suddenly loomed up from nowhere and it was only because his car was equipped with excellent brakes that an accident was averted. Parker said that both he and Mendelson jammed on their brakes and as there was no collision, the latter drove away after passing the witness on the wrong side of the road. Parker said that he stopped at the Pine street and Fourth avenue intersection for a full 30 seconds before making the turn.

The accused took the stand and claimed that Parker had made a very abrupt turn and that if he had not had his car under perfect control, there would have been an accident.

When the Magistrate made the fine, the accused asked for time to pay it. Mendelson said that he was an insurance salesman and Magistrate Atkinson replied that they were the only ones who seem to be making any money these days.

**Disorderly Conduct Cases**

There were nine cases of disorderly conduct before the court, six of the charges proving to be justly laid, and the accused persons were each fined. The other three men were dismissed. One of the latter pleaded guilty but no one knew who made the arrest so the case had to be dismissed.

G. H. Grenfell was the first heard on a charge of disorderly conduct and he was fined \$10 and costs or 20 days.

Chief Paul stated that he had advised

the accused to go home but he had insisted on yelling and shouting in front of the police station at 3:40 a.m. on Friday at the time of the near riot.

Leonard Chenier was fined \$10 and costs or 15 days when he appeared on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Sergeant DesRoches stated that the accused had been giving trouble on Third avenue at 3 o'clock on Friday morning and had been told to move on. He would not listen to the advice and finally ran away when the officer took after him. Constable Archambault later caught him and made the arrest.

A charge of disorderly conduct which had been laid against Louis Turk was dismissed. The charge was made after the police had been called to the Royal Lunch at 12:45 Saturday morning to quell an alleged fight.

Sergeant Walker swore that when the officers arrived the accused was sitting at a table and that he was quite noisy. The witness said that the accused grabbed the officers as they walked past his table and that he was using profane language.

A defence witness stated that the accused had arrived at the cafe after the fight was all over and that he had taken no part in it.

**Said He Was Not Disorderly**

Louie Wong, a waiter in the Royal Lunch, stated that the accused did not make any noise. He said that the trouble was all over when Turk arrived.

Magistrate Atkinson asked Turk if he had been disorderly.

"Not at all," he emphatically replied. A charge of leaving the scene of an accident was levied against Charles F. Percival but it was remanded for one week. Percival, according to the officers, struck a boy on a bicycle and then continued on his way.

Rene Paupart was fined \$10 and costs when he pleaded guilty to a charge of

disorderly conduct. The charge was made following a fight on June 30th.

The case against Thomas Sullivan was remanded for one week. He is charged with having liquor in other than a private residence.

Provincial Constable Johnston stated that he had raided the Pine Grove Inn, which is managed by Sullivan and found five cases of beer in one cabin and 12 pints in another, cooling in a large tub, in another cabin. The officer stated that when he asked Sullivan about the beer, the man replied that he had purchased it at the brewery warehouse in Timmins just a few days before. In checking the files at the warehouse the officer said he could find no record of such a purchase. The Inn had previously been made public.

**Transients Should Not Be Offensive**

Joseph O'Leary was fined \$10 and costs or thirty days on a charge of vagrancy.

Albert Odger testified that the accused had accosted him in the post office and had asked for the price of a meal. When Odger had said that he couldn't give it to him the man had become quite hostile. Odger reported the incident to the police and the man was arrested by Constable Devine.

A charge of theft against Paul Desroacher was dismissed. The complaint was made by Jerry Sterne who was rooming with the accused. Sterne said that he had gone out in the afternoon and when he returned all his clothing was missing. He said that it was later found in a room which the accused had taken after the incident occurred.

Desroacher said that he had taken Sterne to his room and had given him shelter and bought his meals when he did not have any money, and he claimed that the clothing was his own and not the complainant's.

A youth pleaded guilty to a charge of stealing a wrist watch. The magistrate took into consideration that he was only a youngster and said that he would give him another chance. The boy's father signed a bond assuring the authorities that the boy would keep the peace.

**Bold Theft While Drunk**

Two charges were levied against J. Lucas, the first being for theft following the alleged stealing of several articles from the fire hall, and the second for being intoxicated. The first charge was dismissed and the accused was fined \$10 and costs on the charge of drunkenness.
