Police Court News

Three drunks were fined the usual \$10 and costs at Tuesday's police court. The lady who was entering a case of assault and damage to a fox fur and fur coat withdrew the charge at this hearing.

For having no operator's license one paid a fine and for driving at night without lights \$1 and costs.

Many from Connaught were present to hear a case brought against two young men. One was charged with interrupting by "profane discourse" to disturb the order and solemnity of a meeting at the Orange Lodge on March 17th.

Testimony that the young man had gone to the kitchen while ladies were preparing lunch was given. He asked for lunch and was told to go to the proper entry and pay to get into the hall. His language was abusive and he went away to return later with others and pester the ladies once more, finally being forcibly ejected.

The magistrate found that this case had been wrongly charged so dismissed it.

The next case was properly brought. Another man was charged with doing damage to Orange Lodge No. 259, Connaught, on the night of March 17th, by breaking two windows and the lock of the door—damage amounting to \$2.50.

Protestations from the accused that he had already paid \$1 on the damage done led the magistrate to ask him to give his account of the affair.

"I busted one window by accident," he said, "and when they raised a fuss I asked them how much it would cost to break the other. They told me fifty cents so I broke it and paid over to the caretaker one dollar."

"We will allow you one dollar off then," said his worship. "Ten dollars fine with costs plus one dollar fifty damages!"

TAKE NOTICE that after the expiration of FOUR WEEKS from the date of the first publication or posting of this notice, namely the 17th day of March, 1938, the following By-law or a By-law to the similar or like effect, shall be passed by the Council of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Tisdale, viz:—

TOWNSHIP OF TISDALE

By-Law Number

A By-law providing for the closing and stopping up of certain portions of Crawford Street, Strachan Avenue, Quebec Avenue, and of "Walter Lane," all in the Settlement of South Porcupine in the Township of Tisdale; and authorizing the leasing, selling or transferring such stopped-up portions of the highways aforesaid.

WHEREAS it is necessary to enlarge the Public School Grounds in the Settlement of South Porcupine in the Township of Tisdale by adding to the lands now owned by the Public School Board of School Section No. 1, of the Township of Tisdale in the District of Cochrane, certain lands adjacent thereto;

AND WHEREAS proper notice of this By-law has been given by publication and otherwise according to the provisions of The Municipal Act in that behalf;

AND WHEREAS due consideration has been given and compensation made where proper, to provide for the requirements of the owners of the soil or surface rights of lands adjacent to or near the streets and highways herein-after mentioned, and of those who might be affected by the closing thereof to vehicular and pedestrian traffic;

AND WHEREAS adequate means of egress and ingress by road to all lands abutting on the highways or parts of highways hereinafter mentioned have been and are provided;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF TISDALE, as a By-law thereof, as follows:

1. The following highways, parts of highways and lanes shall be, as and from the passing and approval of this By-law, and the same are hereby closed and stopped up to vehicular and pedestrian traffic, namely:—

(1) All that portion of Crawford Street as shown on Plan M-10 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane, from Golden Avenue to Strachan Avenue, both as shown on the said Plan; excepting the East six feet thereof running Southerly from Golden Avenue, aforesaid, a distance of Eighty-one feet, more or less.

(2) All that portion of Strachan Avenue, as shown on Plan M-14 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane which is abutted on the North by Lot One Hundred and Seventy (170) as shown on Plan M-14 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane, and by the West Twenty-five feet (25 ft.) of Lot Number One Hundred and Sixty-nine (169) as shown on the said Plan, and which is abutted on the South by the West Seventy-five feet (75 ft.) of Lot Number One Hundred and Ninety-three (193), as shown on the said Plan.

(3) All that Portion of Strachan Avenue as shown on Plan M-10 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane which is abutted on the South by Lot Number One Hundred and Sixty-one (161) as shown on the said Plan, and by the West Sixty feet (60 ft.) of Lot Number One Hundred and Fifty-six (156) as shown on the said Plan, and which is abutted on the North by Crawford Street as shown on the said Plan and by the West forty-four feet (44 ft.) of

Lot Number One Hundred and Thirtynine (131) as shown on the said Plan.

(4) All that portion of Quebec Avenue as shown on Plan M-20 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane which is abutted on the North by Lots Numbers One Hundred and Sixty-five (165), One Hundred and Sixty-six (166), One Hundred and Sixty-seven (167), and One Hundred and Sixty-Eight (168) all as shown on Plan M-10 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane, and by Lot Number Two Hundred and Nineteen (219) as shown on Plan M-14 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane.

(5) All that portion of the lane known as "Walter Lane" as shown on Plan M-20 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane, which is abutted on the East of Lot Number One (1) as shown on the said Plan.

all of which said highways or parts of highways and lanes are situated in the said Township of Tisdale in the said District of Cochrane.

2. Any and all of the surface rights of the lands in paragraph 1, hereof particularly described shall be, from and after the passing and approval of this By-law, and the same are hereby declared to be disposable by the Corporation of the Township of Tisdale by way of transfer, pledge, lease or otherwise as the Council of the said Corporation in its discretion may deem expedient.

Resident in Timmins for Twenty Years.

The death occurred on March 22nd, after a long illness, of Mr. Ferdina Clermont, at the Water street Hospital, Ottawa. Mr. Clermont had been a resident of Timmins for over twenty years, and two weeks ago left for the Ottawa hospital. He was born at La Chute a Blondeau, Quebec, and was sixty-three years of age.
