

End of Month to Se Unusual Layout of Planets in the Sky

Six Brightest Major Plan ets to be Grouped To gether in the Evening Sk

"During the last week in Februar and the first week in March, there w be quite an unusual distribution planets in the Western sky, visible ju about one hour after sunset, providir the skies are clear." Mr. Sydne Wheeler, government weather observ here, told The Advance.

"The six brightest major planets w all be grouped together in the evenir sky, and will be almost in a straigi line from the horizon up, and inclinit to the left.

"The planet Mercury will be neare to the horizon soon after sunset, and little to the right of where the sun go down just a little above Mercury an to the left of it will be Jupiter, fo lowed higher up still by Venus, th largest and brightest planet of the all to the naked eye.

"Above Venus and in order, slight inclined to the left will be Satur haps not be quite so bright, but 1 those who look carefully it will h easily distinguished by being the la: in a straigh tline; but the five "naked eye" planets will all be within 40 de grees of each other, and in the orde named from the horizon - viz: Mer cury, Jupiter, Venus (the brightest an
