



WORKERS OF THE PORCUPINE CAMP

The appeal made to you last week to help meet the manpower needs of the base metal industry at Sudbury had a fine response from the patriotic men of the Porcupine Camp. A trainload of your fellow-workers has arrived at Sudbury, and more have gone since.

BUT MORE MEN ARE NEEDED - MORE MUST JOIN THOSE WHO HAVE GONE

You know why you are needed. You know why the United Nations must have base metals for the tools of war. The need is urgent, and it is your duty to serve where your skill is most needed now.

So urgent is this need for men that the National Selective Service regulations, which provide that seven days notice must be given before anyone can leave a job, have been suspended. This, of course, applies only if you leave your present job to take this special work at Sudbury.

Here are Some of the Things You May Want to Know - -

PAY

The basic rates of pay at Sudbury are higher than in this camp. Your pay starts on the day you leave for Sudbury. On arrival there, you go into the school stove at 63 cents an hour and, depending on your skill and experience, within a short time you go to the job. During this period if you earn less than you did in Porcupine the difference will be made up to you, providing it is not more than \$5 a week. Pay for machine men, after going on the job, is 71 cents; for muckers and helpers, 63 cents.

HOUSING

There is lots of accommodation for single men. In case you plan to move your family, it is wiser to go to Sudbury first and then make arrangements to move your family after you locate a place for them to live. Their moving and transportation costs will still be paid. Some families have already been moved.

RE-INSTATEMENT

Under the law which protects you when you voluntarily change your job from Porcupine to Sudbury, you are entitled to reinstatement in your former job after completion of the war work.

AGE

Only men over 17 years of age and under 50 years of age will be accepted.

EXPENSES

Full travelling costs are paid for you. If your family moves to Sudbury, their travelling expenses and the cost of moving your furniture will be paid. Cost of living is about the same as in the Porcupine.

MEDICAL EXAMINATION

Because most of the men needed for Sudbury are wanted for underground operations, you must pass a medical examination. The hours and places for these examinations can be learned if you ask your local Employment and Selective Service Office. If you have an x-ray card no chest examination will be necessary. So far, only a small percentage of men have been rejected. If you live at a distant point, arrangements can be made for medical examination at a place convenient for you.

TRANSPORTATION

If you want to go to Sudbury by train, and enough men go at one time, a special car will be arranged for each group. But if you want to drive your own car, you can get the amount of a single fare in cash. This will be paid immediately on your arrival in Sudbury. However, if any friends travel with you, their fares will not be paid. This payment applies only to yourself in your own car.

MILITARY SERVICE

Workers transferring their jobs under this plan are assured of deferment until January 1st, 1943.
