Charge of Keeping **Gaming House** Brings \$200.00 Fine

Kapuskasing Loses One of Its Notable Citizens

Sunday of last week saw the funeral of Mr. Clem Saville, for nearly twentyone years the clerk-treasurer of the town of Kapuskasing. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in Kapuskasing and the large number of beautiful floral tokens evidenced the sorrow at the death and the sincere sympathy attending. All the old hymns were sung, for the bereaved family. The late Mr. Saville occupied so large a place in the public life of Kauskasing that to many it will seem impossible to fill his place. Not only did he carry through his duties as clerk-treasurer with oustanding skill and thoroughness, but he took a large part in all other activities of the town, being president of the Kapuskasing Board of Trade at the time of his death, an active member of the Canadian Legion and took keen interest in every other public cause in the town and district. He was secretary of the pleasant evening to a close. During Kapuskasing Board of Education from the time of its organization until his death. In fraternal circles he was a valued member of Spruce Falls A. F. & A. M. and also a Noble of Rameses Temple, Mystic Shrine.

The late Clement Saville was born at Wakefield, Yorkshire, England, fiftytwo years ago. Educated at Wakefield Academy he went through a comprehen sive course in electrical engineering, eventually becoming superintendent of the Yorkshire Electric Tramways. He served four years in the last war in the Imperial Tank Corps and was severely wounded at Messines Ridge. After the war he came to Canada with his wife and baby daughter.




