Recent Donations to the TTHS

From Ross Wark - the Society has seen a recent influx of donations, including the following new additions:

- A framed watercolor painting of S.S. #15, Merton, donated by Lorna (Lawrence) Wilson of Bolton, Ontario. Lorna remembers the painter rented a house from her father on the south side of Upper Middle Road. The painting signature seems to be: Tolatter 1938. View it in our digital collection here.
- Two **metal plaques** donated by Palermo United Church. One in memory of <u>Henry Heeks</u>, the other commemorating the <u>Palermo Community Hall</u>, <u>1912-1974</u>.
- Seven matted early pictures of Palermo and Dr. Anson Buck, ca. 1912-14, given to us by Bronte Historical Society. View the photo of Dr. Buck, and an accompanying 2-page essay about his life here.

Preserving History at Lazy Pat Farm

The Lazy Pat Farm, which is located at 3269-3271 Dundas Street West in the former Trafalgar Township, has been purchased by a developer and is slated for development. Due to the significant heritage value of the property, the TTHS has been closely monitoring planning for this property to ensure that it is properly preserved.

The land, which is bound by Dundas Street

West, Tremaine Road, Highway 407 and Bronte Road, has roots in the early settlement of the area and the farmhouse has been associated with the subject property since the early 19th century. The McQueen and Wilkinson families have strong ties to the property, and were among the first pioneers to arrive and settle in the area. The Wilkinson family in particular had a long association with the property, having farmed this land for nearly a century (c. 1850 to c. 1920). As such, this property contributes to the story of early township development, and illustrates local history and settlement patterns.

The developer has confirmed that the goal of their project is to "create an environmentally and economically sustainable employment district that will contribute to the dynamic character of the Town of Oakville," and "in order to reach this goal the Concept Plan must balance environmental opportunities with economic realities to create an employment district that is visually attractive, environmentally responsible and functionally efficient."

TTHS was consulted by Heritage Planning at the Town of Oakville, and worked with them to preserve this historical property. We voiced our opinion that this property provides us with an excellent opportunity to capture the farming history of Trafalgar Township, and to provide a unique park for the public to enjoy.

TTHS offered a number of recommendations to the Heritage Oakville Advisory Committee pertaining to the preservation of the property, which were contradictory to that of staff in the Heritage Planning Department. The Heritage Oakville Advisory Committee discussed this property on September 22, 2015, and adopted many of our recommendations not contemplated by staff including the retention of the original farmhouse and the summer house.


The Committee ultimately endorsed the following, resulting in a triumph for Lazy Pat Farm:

- 1. That the Conservation Management Strategy dated July 2015, be supported in principle for future implementation with particular attention paid to the possibilities of restoration and adaptive reuse of the original farmhouse, the barn and the summer house; and
- 2. That a Notice of Intention to Designate under Part IV, Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act be issued for the identified cultural heritage landscape of the property at 3269 Dundas Street West.

In early November 2015, the farmhouse windows were secured and the basement was drained of standing water; a pump system was left in place so that water could be routinely pumped out.

The TTHS will continue to monitor the development of this historical property, to ensure that it is properly preserved and recognized as an important part of the history of Trafalgar Township.


TTHS Reports: Harvey Morris Switzer

Early in December 2015, the TTHS received an email from two cousins inquiring about their ancestor, Harvey Morris Switzer. Specifically, they asked if we had a photograph of Mr. Switzer - we didn't.

What we *did* have were <u>photographs of the house</u> built in Palermo by this early, prominent Trafalgar Township citizen (still inhabited and on the Town of Oakville 2007 Heritage Inventory List), and documents and information about Harvey Switzer as he had been a general merchant and Postmaster at Palermo, a County Magistrate and Commissioner in the Court of Queen's Bench. He held the positions of Captain and Paymaster in the 20th Halton Battalion, the volunteer militia. He was a founding member of the Halton Agricultural Society which started in 1853. He was a member of the Conservative Party and also a trustee of the Hamilton and Northwestern Railway.

Thanks to Wilfrid Morrison, James Morrison and Neil Switzer, we have now posted a photograph of <u>Harvey Switzer in his</u> <u>20th Halton Rifles uniform</u>, and <u>another studio photograph</u> almost certainly of him (although not absolutely identified as such in the family album).

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

Wanted: information about George Morrison

- An inquiry has come from Bev Trew Palmer, a genealogist in Indiana, asking for information on early area resident George Morrison, a shoemaker as per the 1845 Census; Bev knows that George was born in New Brunswick on March 24, 1803. His father, John Morrison, appears on the Trafalgar Township tax list of 1827 and is on the 1828 Nominal List of people belonging to the 2nd Regiment Gore Militia, Trafalgar. George married Sarah M. Buck on March 9, 1832 Jordan Munn was a marriage witness. Sarah died on February 20, 1866 in Malahide Township, Elgin County, Ontario. Census information shows that George moved to Michigan in the early 1870s, likely joining other family, and he died there on June 3, 1888. Please contact Bev if you have information on George Morrison and/or his family.
- Wanted: information on the naming of Trafalgar-area school
 - ➤ While working on the OurOntario entry for a photograph of Munn's School, S.S. #3A, TTHS member Anne Choate Little noticed that unlike most local schools, the school section number in the photograph includes an "A." This interesting detail would make a great addition to the record any members able to clarify why the "A" was included, please contact Anne.
