You are cordially invited to come to the campus of Waterloo Lutheran University, located in Waterloo-Kitchener, Ontario, one of Canada's great new cultural centres.

Here you find quality education, friendship, recreation, and refreshment in the intimate, Christian setting.

Waterloo Lutheran University consists of Waterloo University College and Waterloo Lutheran Seminary. There are the regular school sessions of college and seminary, extension courses, and a summer session. Other graduate schools will be established shortly.

To fulfill its purpose as an educational centre, Waterloo Lutheran University opens its doors to all groups that would make use of its facilities during the regular college year and in the open summer months. As a result, facilities are used by civic, religious, educational, and athletic organizations for conventions, conferences, workshops, retreats, training sessions, camping programs, and dinner events.

Facilities are modern, the campus family stimulating, the location central. Within easy reach, for example, is the world-famous Stratford Arts Festival and the performing arts events in Toronto as well as those in Kitchener-Waterloo.

Waterloo Lutheran University offers unusual value in a liberal arts education and in the use of its facilities. Fees are moderate. And for matriculating students there is a variety of financial aids in the form of scholarships, bursaries, loans, and campus employment.

WLU offers qualified students a liberal education in a community of higher learning that acknowledges Jesus Christ as Divine Lord and Saviour. It is an educational institution of the Lutheran Church in America and is sponsored by the Eastern Canada Synod. Students of many religious faiths pursue their studies here. Student life is designed to achieve high scholastic attainment and provide

an ethical, moral, and spiritual basis for life, rooted in the Christian faith.

Waterloo Lutheran University is located on a hill-side campus with nine buildings, two more under construction, and several more on the drawing boards. It has a full and part-time student body of more than 2,200 men and women from five continents. The university operates on a balanced budget, has gross assets of \$4,835,509 and is now seeking capital funds totaling \$4,500,000 for new academic buildings.

ROOM TO TEACH, TO LEARN

The Arts Building, enlarged in 1963, contains lecture rooms, administrative and faculty offices, music room, laboratories, faculty and student lounges, print shop, mail-room, and the popular Torque Room where light lunches and coffee break refreshments are available.

ROOM TO LOUNGE AND DISCUSS

Nearby is the Student Union, completed in 1962, with spacious lounge and discussion rooms as well as offices for student organizations, student publications, director of student activities, alumni association, and bookstore.

DRAMA, CONCERTS, PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The theatre-auditorium, dedicated in 1962, has a seating capacity of 1,400 and provides facilities for dramatic presentations, rallies, dances, and physical education programs for men and women.

LIBRARY

Located in historic Willison Hall temporarily, the university library has 50,000 volumes. As soon as generous friends make it possible, a new library will be built to house 150,000 volumes in a modern setting for research and study.

DINING HALL

A modern dining hall, which opened its doors in 1962, has facilities for more than 500 persons in its main dining

room. Additional features are private mezzanine dining rooms and lecture halls, available for small dinner parties, teas, and receptions.

RESIDENCES

Residences for single men and women accommodate 475 persons. Dormitory facilities, supervised by representatives of the administration and residence committees, consist of single and double rooms as well as social lounges and recreation halls. Student rooms are combined bedroom and study rooms, fully furnished.

Women's Residence was completed in 1961 and another wing opened in January, 1963. The complex accommodates 150 women students, a housemother, and student dons. In addition to the lounge, library, TV room, recreation room, and laundry room on the main floor, there are lounges and study rooms on each floor.

Men's Residences consist of three buildings:

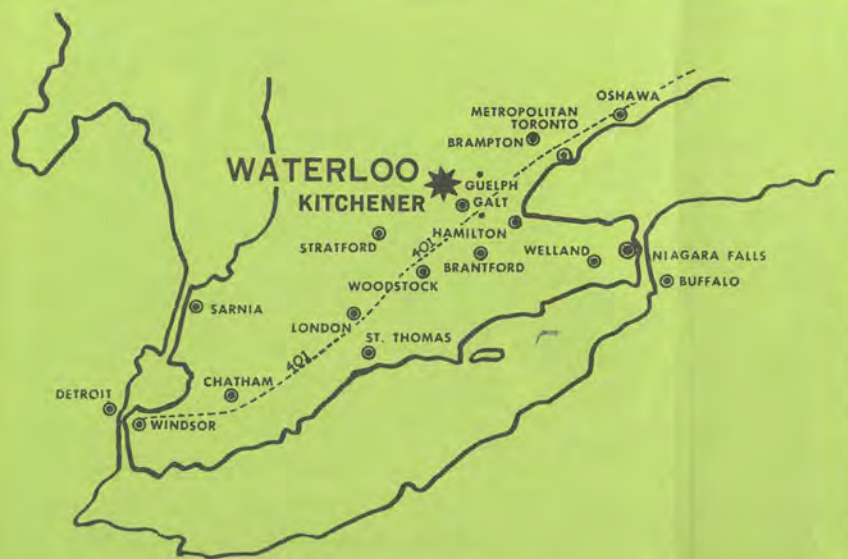
1. West Hall, opened in the fall of 1962, has accommodations for 100 men, student dons and a resident faculty advisor. Lounges, recreation room, TV room, laundry and library are also provided.

2. East Hall, completed in January 1963, accommodates 162 men, student dons, and a resident faculty member. Lounges, recreation room, TV room, laundry and library.

3. Willison Hall, a landmark named after the first graduate of the college and seminary, accommodates 63 men.

NEW SEMINARY BUILDING

The new seminary unit, ready for occupancy in September 1963, includes facilities for teaching, students quarters, administrative and faculty offices, and chapel. This building was completely financed through the generosity of



church members giving through the Canada and Nova Scotia Synods' Centennial Appeal, 1961-63.

RELATIONSHIPS

Waterloo Lutheran University is part of the network of 32 colleges, universities, and seminaries of the Lutheran Church in America, largest of the Lutheran Church bodies on the North American continent. Its sponsoring agency is the Eastern Canada Synod of the LCA which includes five eastern provinces of Canada. The WLU purpose is to serve community, church, and country through an educational program that is independent and is based upon Christian convictions. Faculty and administrative staff personnel is selected on the basis of scholarship, love of teaching, concern for students, active church membership, and commitment to participation in campus and community affairs.

HISTORY

History begins for Waterloo Lutheran University in 1910 when the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Canada was established by two Canadian Lutheran Synods. Its doors opened in 1911 and the institution was incorporated in 1913. Pre-theological education began in 1914 and courses leading to senior matriculation were given in the lower school of Waterloo College. In 1923 a one year's Arts course beyond Senior Matriculation was offered. In 1924 this venture was expanded into the third of Waterloo's educational units, the Waterloo College of Arts, offering a four year's

Arts course. Emphasis having been shifted to higher education, the preparatory courses of the college's lower school were reduced and finally abandoned in 1929.

Waterloo College affiliated in 1925 with the University of Western Ontario. Five years later the right was granted to offer courses leading to the honours B.A. degrees. Curriculum expanded and more than 1,000 students completed requirements for the bachelor's degree during 35 years of this affiliation.

Waterloo Seminary and College were re-chartered in early 1959 and were given the corporate title of Waterloo Lutheran University by the Provincial Legislative Assembly. The affiliation with the University of Western Ontario was terminated in 1960. Thus Waterloo Lutheran University has university powers and degree-granting rights of its own. Degrees are now granted in Arts and Theology. Degrees in Science are proposed. More than 3,000 alumni and former students have been given instruction in the Liberal Arts for 38 years.

In August 1961 the Mennonite Brethren College of Arts in Winnipeg, Manitoba, affiliated with Waterloo Lutheran University.

President of Waterloo Lutheran University is Dr. William J. Villaume. Dr. Lloyd H. Schaus is academic dean of Waterloo University College. Dr. J. Ray Houser is president and Dr. Ulrich S. Leupold is dean of the seminary. Harry D. Greb is chairman of the Board of Governors.

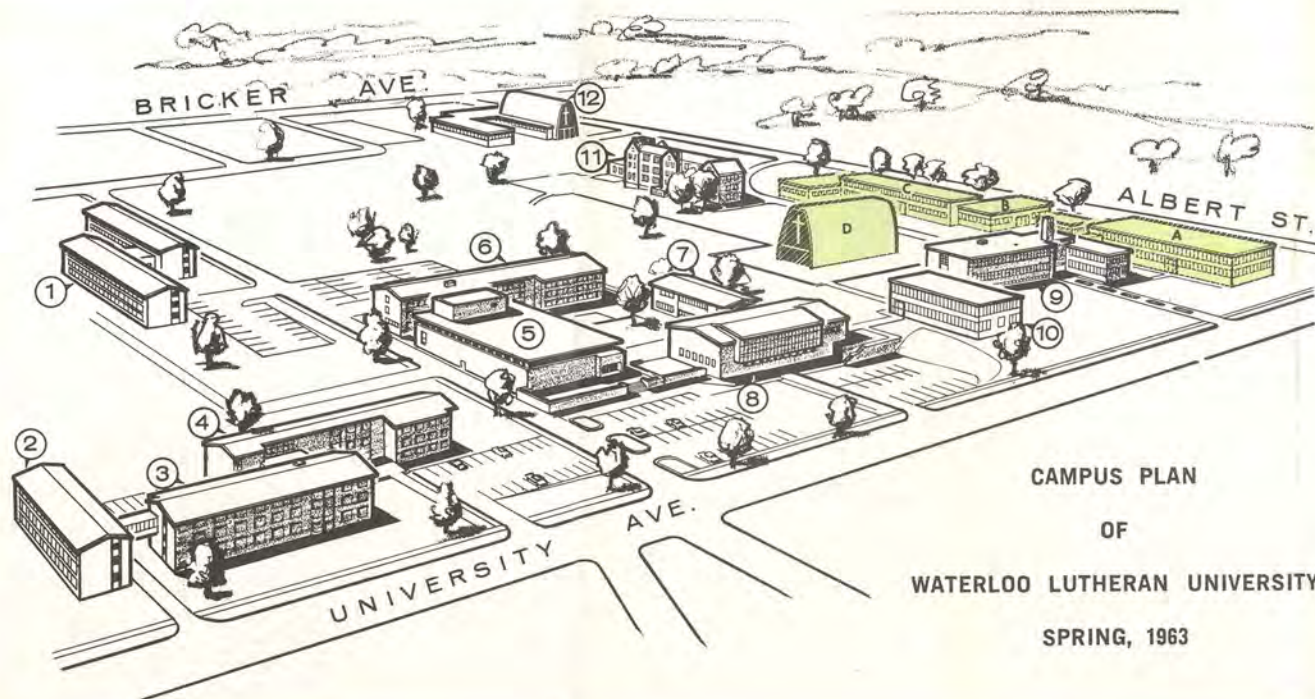
WLU students come from all sections of Canada, the United States, and overseas points such as Germany, West Indies, British Guiana, Hong Kong, and Liberia. Lecturers, groups in the performing arts, and visitors from all parts of the world come to the campus to participate in the university's regular or special programs.

Facilities, especially in the summer period, are open for use by educational, civic, religious, fraternal, and athletic organizations.

Some of the groups now using campus facilities (1962-63) are:

Eastern Canada Synod of the Lutheran Church in America Constituting Convention, Ontario Parks Association, Toronto Argonaut Football Club, Ontario Police Sergeants Course, Luther League of Canada, Luther League Training School, Mennonite World Conference, the Inter-denominational Camp Farthest Out, Ontario Educational Association—Home Economists Study Conference, Ontario District Walther League Convention, Royal Canadian College of Organists, Ontario Library Association, Lutheran Deacons Conference of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, and the Hamilton Conference of the United Church.

Breakfast, luncheon, dinner and reception events have been held on the campus by the Waterloo Chamber of Commerce, the Ontario Federation of Home and School Associations—Kitchener-Waterloo Branch, and the Lutheran Laymen's Movement for Stewardship.



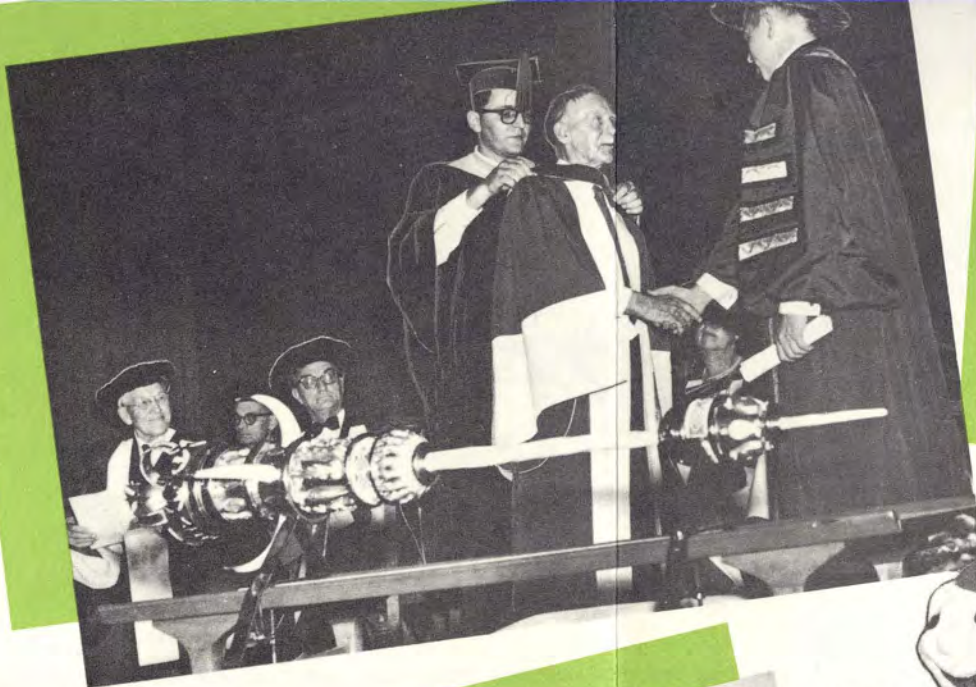
CAMPUS PLAN

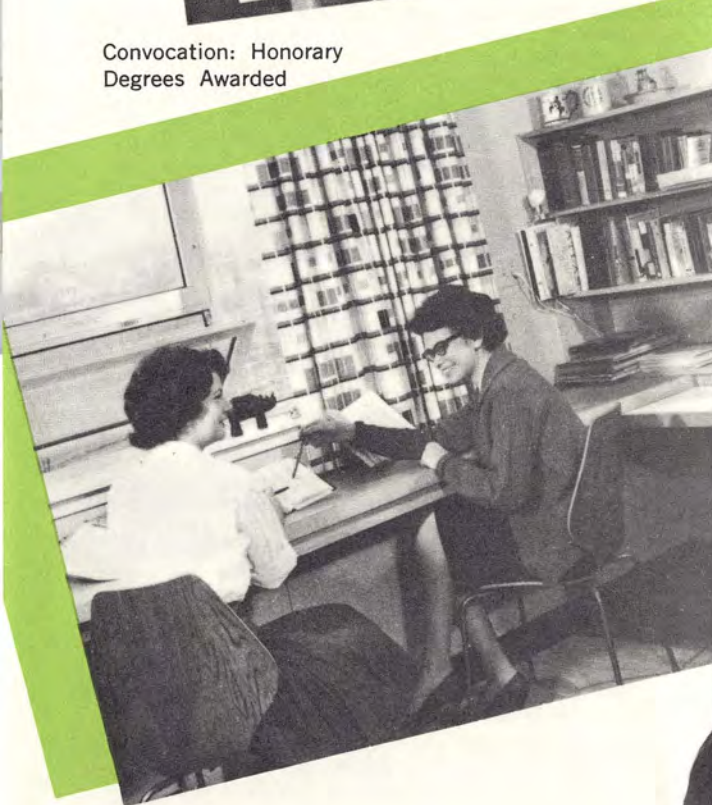

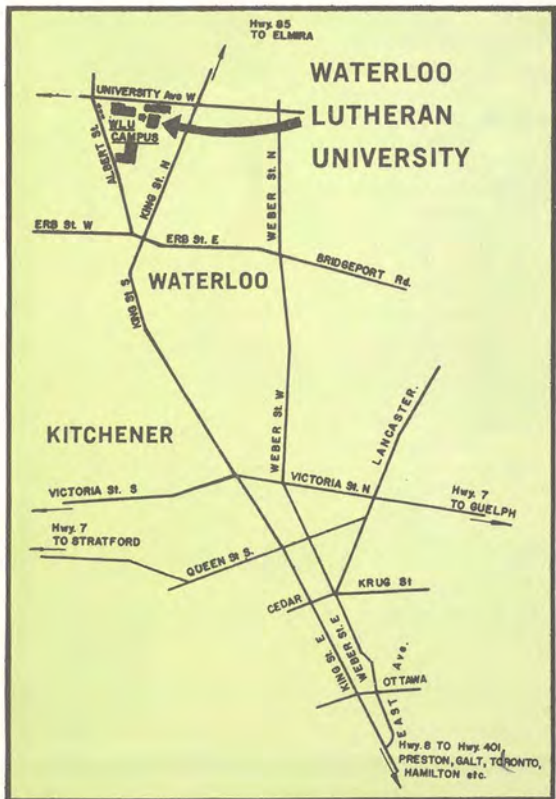
