Parade of events to feature  
anniversary year Homecoming

A parade of events and a parade will mark Wilfrid Laurier University's Homecoming '86, Sept. 25-28, held as the university marks the 75th anniversary of its founding.

The parade, with more than 20 floats, will wind its way through uptown Waterloo, starting at 11 a.m. Sept. 27 from the athletic building at King Street and University Avenue, Waterloo.

Floats will be judged and the winners announced at the Homecoming football game that afternoon at Seagram Stadium. The game, beginning at 2 p.m., will pit the Laurier Golden Hawks against the University of Guelph Gryphons.

The annual alumni meeting will be held that same day, with a free brunch for all alumni attending, beginning at 10 a.m. in the dining hall building. A new board of directors will be elected and three new honorary alumni will be named-- Dr. Max Stewart, a popular economics professor; Fred Nichols, dean of students; and James Hertel, university photographer.

That night, there will be reunion dinners for graduates of the classes of 1948 through 1953, 1966, 1971, and 1981.

A Homecoming dance and buffet, sponsored by the WLU Alumni Association and the Laurier Lettermen's Club, begins that night at 8:30 p.m. It is being held on campus in the Turret lounge of the student building.

Already fully booked is a Sept. 26 golf tournament and dinner at the Conestoga Golf Club, sponsored by the Tamiae Club.

Other scheduled events are a social work faculty 20th anniversary chapter dinner Sept. 25, followed by the annual Easton-McCarney memorial lecture, this year with American social work professional and author, Dr. Leon Ginsberg. He will discuss social work education and practice in the 21st century, at 8 p.m. in the main lecture hall in the Frank C. Peters Building.

The next day, the social work faculty will host its third Alumni College, when alumni and friends will debate issues arising from Dr. Ginsberg's lecture. It begins at 9 a.m.

The Laurier school of business and economics will also hold an Alumni College, during the morning of Sept. 26, also beginning at 9 a.m. A number of academic specialists will discuss The Changing world of Accounting. There is still time to register, a spokesman said.

Other events include the fourth annual 10 km alumni race on Sept. 27, beginning at 8 a.m. at the athletic building; an alumni tree planting ceremony at noon on Sept. 28, marking the 75th anniversary, followed by a reception for alumni and their friends; and a reception for members of the President's and Chancellor's Clubs at the Westmount Golf and Country Club, later that day.
