COMING EVENTS AT LAURIER

Tuesday, Feb. 14

The board of governors will meet at 10 a.m. in the Paul Martin Centre. It will consider a senate recommendation for a new university crest and review a budget update for the year ending April 1989. The complete agenda will be available at the meeting.

Wednesday, Feb. 15

Mark MacGuigan, minister of justice and attorney general in the Trudeau cabinet of 1982-84 and now a judge in the Federal Court of Appeal, will speak on ethics and the law. He will touch on issues such as Sunday shopping, abortion, biomedics and family law. The public lecture will begin at 8 p.m. in the recital hall of the John Aird Centre.
