WATERLOO – A student-run computer consultancy at Wilfrid Laurier University is launching a new program, which will bring personalized and interactive training into area workplaces, with a series of free lunch-and-learn sessions.

Student Connections at Laurier recently introduced interactive seminars on a range of technology-related topics in workplaces. This free initiative is designed to help businesses learn more about specific computer and Internet issues. It also allows Student Connections to introduce its new Team Technology Training (T3) program.
