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RECORD ENROLMENT

For the first time in the history of the institution, it became necessary to limit the enrolment at Waterloo University College. Early in September it became apparent that the number of applications for admission would over-tax the facilities. When the figures were finally tallied, they showed 1012 students enrolled in courses for the 1961-62 term.

Following is a break-down of the registration for 1961-62:

In addition to this there are 61 students at the affiliated Mennonite Brethren College in Winnipeg registered with Waterloo University College. If the Summer School enrolment of 190 is included the total for the 1961-62 academic year is 1263.
