MINUTES 1983 ANNUAL MEETING WOMEN'S AUXILIARY OF WATERLOO LUTHERAN SEMINARY

Minutes of the annual meeting commemorating the 70th Anniversary of the Women's Auxiliary of Waterloo Lutheran Seminary, held at Trinity Lutheran Church, Tavistock-Sebastopol, on Wednesday, September 28, 1983.

The president, Mrs. Dorothy Schaefer, called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. with a welcome to all, especially those who are attending for the very first time.

In the absence of the Rev. Forrest Mosher, Pastor of the church, greetings were brought to the meeting by Karl Fieldhouse, the Intern at Trinity Church.

Opening hymn 231 - "O Word of God Incarnate", followed by the responsive reading of Psalm 150 and prayer.

Lesson was from Ephesians 2:20, "You, too, are built upon the foundation laid by the apostles and prophets, the cornerstone being Jesus Christ himself."

Karl Fieldhouse spoke of the members of the Auxiliary as workers who build the finished product by helping the Seminarians by providing for their comfort along the way. By so doing they are building the church of Christ. Each one is a brick or a stone, helping to build God's holy temple.

Closing hymn 557 - "Let All Things Now Living".

Dr. Delton Glebe, in bringing greetings from the Seminary, remarked that the outlook of students entering Seminary is more positive than ever. Some of them are second career people. It is also to the advantage of the Seminarians, if they can combine the academic and the practical.

Enrollment:

Enrollment is down slightly from last year. Comparing the years, the figures are: 1970 - 35 students 1982 - 115 " 1983 - 112 "

Dr. Glebe announced that Synod has given permission to the Seminary to go on the territory of Synod to establish an endowment fund for the Seminary.

This will be Dr. Glebe's final year as Dean of the Seminary.

BUSINESS SESSION

1. <u>Report of the President.</u> Mrs. Dorothy Schaefer, president, reported that the Executive Board met 5 times to carry on the business of the Auxiliary between annual meetings.

For the first time, in many years, there was a full executive, with all offices and appointments filled.

The executive assisted with the Fellowship Hour following the Reformation Service on October 31, 1982.

Recently, on September 18, 1983, the executive served refreshments after the first chapel service of the new academic year. These contacts with the Seminarians are appreciated.

In March, the president, on behalf of the Auxiliary, presented gift certificates from Fortress Church Supply Store to 12 Seminary Graduates and one part time student. The letters of thanks for the gift certificates and assistance with clinical training, were on display.

A letter of thanks was read from Mr. Horace Braden, Director of Student Awards, Wilfrid Laurier University, for the \$200.00 bursary to a W.L.U. student. Each year he interviews a large number of students before selecting the one they feel is most deserving of this award.

Recently, a gift of \$500.00 to the Auxiliary, in memory of the 5th president, Mrs. Olive Musselman, was given by her husband. We are thankful for this gift and will announce how it will be used at a later time.

The executive is very grateful to the members of the Auxiliary for the beautiful quilts sent in again this year, as for the past 70 years, and which are much appreciated by the Seminarians.

This year we have received 30 quilts, 1 pr. of pillowcases and \$25.00 toward the cost of a quilt.

Also a word of thanks was extended to the 28 congregations who sent in the names on their membership lists. The president announced that we have 1058 members in the Auxiliary, and 3 anonymous members, and hoped that more names of members will be sent in next year. The lists were on display at the meeting.

The president thanked Dr. Glebe, the Seminary office staff, and all members of the Executive Board, for their assistance, support and co-operation.

Mrs. Isabel Dotzenroth, 1st. Vice-President, who took the chair while the president Mrs. Dorothy Schaefer gave her report, voiced her appreciation to our dedicated president, who always seems to handle the administration of the Auxiliary in such an efficient manner.

Eight of the ladies who represent this group from the Mennonite Church were called in to receive our thanks for the efficient way they handled this meal.

Mrs. Isabel Dotzenroth introduced Dr. Delton Glebe, amid gales of laughter, as she had left her notes in her bedroom this morning, after rehearsing what she was going to say regarding Dr. Glebe's accomplishments.

Dr. Glebe began his anniversary address by reminding the audience that the early history of Waterloo Seminary shows that the Auxiliary played no small part to keep the Seminarians fed and housed, especially during the depression years. So it is literally true that it had to crawl before it could run.

He compared the volunteer members of the Auxiliary to be the aroma of Christ, spreading His fragrance everywhere these 70 years of operation. In the early years, the Auxiliary members washed, ironed, mended, canned and prepared meals for the students.

Dr. Glebe believes that over the years the Auxiliary has donated one-half to three-quarters of a million dollars in furnishings, drapes, and equipment to the Seminary.

Jesus all his life served as a volunteer. He never received any money for his work. By being a volunteer, He brought us life and salvation. Jesus said: "Not mine, but your will be done." Learning to be a volunteer now has meaning in life. Actions speak louder than words.


Response: We thank You, Lord.
