- "Human or Natural Science: Implications for Psychological Approaches to the Contemporary Interface between Science and Religions," Professor Richard Walsh from Laurier's Department of Psychology.
- "An Aboriginal Approach to Religions and Science: Belief and Truth?" Jean Becker, senior advisor of Laurier's Office of Aboriginal Initiatives.
- "Religions, Science and the Secular: the Possibility of New Relationships?" a concluding plenary panel and discussion.
