## ANNOUNCES NEW ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Waterloo Lutheran University today announced changes in its admission requirements for September 1966 in a move to keep pace with changes in Ontario Grade 13.

In place of the former nine papers, the university will adopt a "credit" system in judging Grade 13 applicants.

Dr. L. H. Schaus, dean of the arts and science faculty, said eight credits will be required for admission to the general arts and general science programs.

All Grade 13 language courses count as two credits. All other courses count as one credit.

"The change keeps step with the desire of the provincial government to decrease the Grade 13 papers but study the remaining subjects in more depth," Dr. Schaus said.

Waterloo Lutheran University also will accept graduates of the experimental Grade 13, being undertaken this fall in several high schools in Metro Toronto. Under this plan, which might become general, some subjects will be studied at an advanced level.

Entrance requirements for September 1966 in the general arts program are senior matriculation with an overall standing of 60 per cent preferred in the following subjects:

- 1. English (two credits)
- 2. A second language (two credits)
- 3. A third language (two credits); or Mathematics (two credits from algebra, geometry, trigonometry and statics) or two credits from biology, chemistry or physics.
- 4. Two additional credits from art, biology, chemistry, geography, history, language, mathematics, music, physics.

General science entrance requirements for September 1966 are senior matriculation with an overall standing of 60 per cent, and a minimum average of 60 per cent in the sciences and mathematics. Subjects are:

- 1. English (two credits)
- Chemistry (one credit)
- Physics (one credit)
- 4. Mathematics (three credits, algebra, geometry, and trigonometry and statics)
- 5. One additional credit from biology, geography, history, language, music.

To be eligible for admission to the bachelor of science program, a student must have completed a language, other than English, at least at the Grade 12 level. Previously, this second language was required at the Grade 13 level.
