WLU TOP ATHLETE AWARD TO

PAUL HEINBECKER OF WATERLOO

Paul Heinbecker of Waterloo has been awarded the Bill Haggstrom Trophy for the greatest contribution to athletics at Waterloo Lutheran University. The award, one of 135, was presented at the annual athletic banquet tonight (Wednesday).

A fourth year honours history student, Heinbecker played four years as halfback, quarterback and defensive half for the Golden Hawks earning league all-star rating. He also played intercollegiate hockey for two years. Drafted by the Edmonton Eskimos, Paul expects to turn out with the club in June and continue studies towards his Master's degree at the University of Alberta.

The Bill Fedor Trophy to the most valuable football player went, for the second straight season, to halfback Erhart (Ed) Turek of Hamilton. Although hampered by injuries, the 200 pound speedster was named to second All-Canadian team.

High-scoring forward Bob Eaton of London, who led WLU to their second straight OIAA title, was awarded the Arthur Little Trophy as the most valuable basketball player.

Harry Reynolds, three-year veteran from Apsley, Ontario, received the Lettermen's trophy as the most valuable member of the hockey Golden Hawks.

WLU participated in ten intercollegiate sports in 1964-65 and captured league titles in five of them: basketball, curling, golf, tennis and table tennis, reported athletic director R. A. (Dick) Buendorf. Buendorf, who announced his resignation to take a financial position in his native Minneapolis, Minnesota, thanked the athletes, faculty and news media for their assistance during his three years at WLU.

University crests were presented to 71 male and 36 female athletes following their first year of intercollegiate competition. In major sports second year competitors received the university letter, third year winners a blanket, and for the first time in the school's history, four-year awards, plagues, were presented.
