WLU Offers Opportunity

<u>For Study At Durham Castle</u>

Waterloo Lutheran University will again offer an opportunity for study in England when it holds its second Durham summer session next year at University College, The Castle, Durham. Two full credit courses will be offered--Political Science and Geography.

The courses will be taught by WLU professors and are open to all but may appeal especially to adult extension students who wish to combine credit work with the pleasure of visiting ancient Durham.

Following last year's successful format, lectures will be given four mornings a week for six weeks beginning July 2. Afternoons will be free for study or excursions to historical and geological sites as will the fifth day of each week.

Cost for a student taking two courses will be \$765 and include accommodation, tuition and travel during the courses. If only one course is taken the cost is \$640. Not included in these figures are travel, with many charter flights available at a cost of about \$230.

Director of the Durham summer session is Dr. Walter Shelton, who warns that time is short if you hope to be included among those attending. Formal registration must be completed by November 30. A first payment of \$200 by certified cheque will be required with two further instalm ents due February 15 and March 31.

Dr. Shelton, who himself studied at Durham, said students will find their accommodations comfortable. There are private rooms, a Great Hall with its splendid setting for dinners and social events, library facilities, a common room with bar, plus a television room and billiard room.

The courses offered are especially suitable for teaching in England.

The first, in Political Science, examines the nature of British institutions and policies. It explores the operation of Parliament, the monarchy, the civil service and the ways these have been adapted in North America, Europe and developing countries. The Geography course is concerned with the non-communist continental states, the United Kingdom and Ireland. Special emphasis will be placed on the geography of the United Kingdom, taking advantage of the location with visits to several of the new preplanned cities of Scotland and northern England.
