Conrad Sarzynick, member of the Greater Vancouver Wood Arts Society (GVWAS) asks, "What can be done with a log full of cracks, a knotted burl, a precut plank, or even a half-rotted stump? What will the final piece look like?" He answers with his work. "Transforming wood into sculpture is an act of discovery. Beginning with the wood, I see what it has to offer and where this can lead me. "

Take a walk to the Edge of the Forest exhibit at CityScape Community Art Space featuring a juried selection of studio furniture makers and designers from British Columbia. Immerse yourself in furniture & furnishings constructed in various mediums including wood, metal, and glass, showcasing the breadth and depth of local contemporary studio furniture.

According to Jeff Trigg, President, GVWAS "The Society was formed to promote the joy, art and craft of fine woodworking, both locally and internationally." They have a growing membership of men and women who demonstrate interest and skill, ranging from fine furniture, musical instruments, turnings, cabinetry, trim and finish carpentry, to decorative art. Trigg creates pieces reflecting his "connection to the natural landscape of British Columbia" bringing a keen sense of detail to

each highly-original design.

Greater Vancouver Wood Arts Society members are passionate about their work. James Esworthy says, "When everything is stripped away, the design, the material and the purpose, what is left is craftsmanship; a person's integrity as an individual and as an artist."

"I leave a bit of myself in each piece" says Yousef Ahadi. "I leave a part of my soul."
