At the last meeting of the Ass At the last meeting of the Association a speaker suggested that what is known as the "Shield's flume," designed to carry water from Cypress Creek (2,100 feet level) to the pond near the Shields railway in the east end (1,200 feet level) be used as the basis of a distribution system, presumably to the higher level which cannot be reached by a service from the Canilago River. the Capilano River.
