Hollyburn Wharf and Postal Buildings Discussed

The West Vancouver Liberal Association held its regular monthly meeting last Tuesday night in the Ambleside Hall, President John Lawson occupying the chair. After the ordinary routine matters had been disposed of there was a discussion about the condition of Hollyburn Wharf. It was mentioned that representations had been made previously to the government authorities regarding this, when the government had agreed to spend a certain sum on rehabilitation of the structure and the preservation of the breakwater. This wharf, it was pointed out, was constructed 19 years ago and its present condition was anything but satisfactory. It was decided to appoint a committee to approach Dominion Engineer Worsfelt to ascertain what action had been taken regarding these repairs. It was also decided to bring the question of the breakwater again to the attention of the Dominion authorities with a request that immediate action be taken towards the maintenance of this necessity.

Hay was instructed to write the Postmaster General and forward a resolution, dealing with the necessity of improved building accomodation for the postal business of West Vancouver, which had been passed. A leply was received from Postmaster General Venoit saying that he will have the matter looked into carefully and a report made to the department of Public Works. He pointed out that the construction of all public buildings comes entirely under the jurisdiction of that department.

Districts were apportioned to the different commissioners and the canvass will be pursued actively from now until the last day for registration, i.e., April 7th.
