Says Swallows are Benefit

Editor West Van. News, Sir:—

A number of West Vancouver bird lovers wish to offer a word of appreciation of Mr. Fletcher's kindly tolerance in allowing the colony of cliff swallows to rear their broods unmolested under the eaves of our local theatre.

Twenty-eight pairs of swallows have extended the stucco work with their nests and are now feeding their young with an estimated average of six thousand insects a day per nest.

This, of course, does entail some unsightliness in detritus, which gives some thoughtless ones an opportunity to use a hose to the destruction of the homes of these useful birds which destroy the hosts of sixteen distinct diseases and germs as well.

Your space will not allow me to dilate at length on the very great value of insectivorous bird life to human welfare of which I think the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine is authority, so I will again offer my thanks and those of my friends to Mr. Fletcher for his broad charity and thoughtfulness in allowing our avian friends to remain undisturbed.

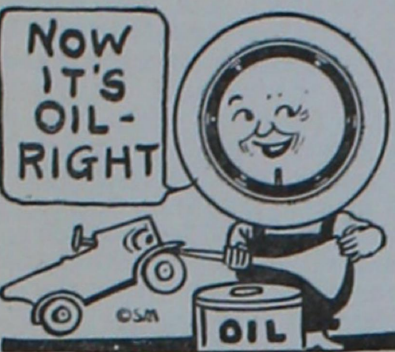
