TAX ARREARS BEING PAID

Municipal income for the first three months of this year shows an increase of 20 per cent. over that of the corresponding period in 1929, it is announced by Reeve J. B. Leyland. There is a notable increase in payment of tax arrears and collections to date are the best since 1926.

ELECTRICITY FOR FIRST NARROWS LIGHTHOUSE

Gordon Halkett, superintendent of the lighthouse service, paid a visit of inspection last Tuesday to the First Narrows lighthouse in connection with improvements thereto. Up to the present coal oil has been used in the revolving light and for the general illumination of the building, but arrangements are now under way to employ electricity in its stead.

NORTH SHORE VITAL STATISTICS

George S. Shepherd, registrar of vital statistics, reports that during the first three months of this year there were recorded in the three North Shore municipalities sixty-six births, thirty-eight deaths and thirteen marriages. In March there were recorded in the three municipalities nineteen births, eight deaths and four marriages.

BRIDGE TRAFFIC SHOWS BIG GAINS

Traffic over Second Narrows bridge in the first three months of this year shows substantial gains in all departments, compared with the totals for the corresponding period of last year according to the report of Manager Percy Ward.

In the first three months of this year 440,398 persons, 167,958 autos, 36,185 trucks and 3629 other vehicles crossed the bridge, compared with 384,182 persons, 145,514 autos, 28,708 trucks and 3403 other vehicles in the first three months of last year.

The following gains for the first quarter of this year are shown: Persons, 56,216; autos, 22,444; trucks, 7477; other vehicles, 226.

The average daily earnings in the first quarter of this year was \$373 and the average for the first quarter of last year \$320.

The manager's report also shows that in the first three months of this year 170 trains composed of 3151 railway cars crossed the bridge; compared with 178 trains composed of 3082 railway cars crossing in the first quarter of last year.

In the first three months of this year 3321 vessels passed under the bridge and 1094 passed through the open draw. In the first three months of last year, 3072 vessels passed under the bridge and 934 passed through the open draw.

During March, 193,313 persons, 70,926 autos, 13,346 trucks and 1466 other vehicles crossed the bridge. The average daily earnings for March was \$468, compared with \$420 in March of last year.

NORTH VAN. FERRY TRAFFIC SHOWS DECREASE

Traffic on the North Vancouver ferries in the first three months of this year shows a decrease, compared with the first quarter of last year, report ferry officials.

In the first three months the ferries carried 645,999 passengers and 23,169 vehicles, compared with 678,717 passengers and 29,388 vehicles in the first three months of last year, showing decreases of 32,718 in passengers and 6219 in vehicles.

In March the ferries carried 235,433 passengers and 8370 vehicles, compared with 245,529 passengers and 9873 vehicles in March last year.

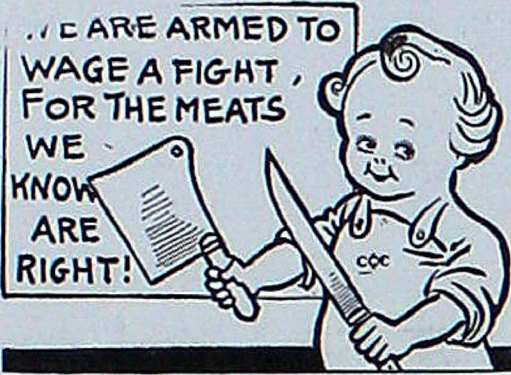
