Conservative meeting (Continued from page 1) ment was \$7,000,000. In 1928 it had increased to \$25,000,000. Dr. Tolmie in taking over had found a treasury containing nothing but I.O.U.'s, and had had to borrow \$8,000,000 to meet the deficit left by the Liberals.

They found the Sumas scheme had cost their predecessors \$3,500,000 instead of the estimate of \$1,800,000, and it would grow nothing. They had put the land on the market, and had since 1928 sold 6,088 acres to 68 bona fide settlers, who were growing crops and paying taxes.

The Liberals had spent \$600,000 at Creston, but the soldier settlers had left because there was no water. Since 1928 they had put on a water system at a cost of \$60,000 and settlers were coming back and bringing prosperity to Creston.

The Oliver dam had cost the Liberal Government \$2,500,000 but the settlers could not pay the rates, and had started to move away. They had cut down the value of the land since 1928 so that men could make a living with the result that they had kept the settlers they had found and new ones were coming in.

The Tolmie government had largely increased agricultural production, and they stood on their record, asking the voters to give them a little encouragement by supporting Mr. Loutet.

EXTENSION OF SERVICE IN WEST VANCOUVER

Extension of lighting service in the municipality of West Vancouver is now being undertaken by the B. C. Electric Railway Company with the construction of a distribution circuit to serve the districts of Whytecliff, Horseshoe Bay, Gleneagles, and Eagle Harbor, containing over 200 homes.

The Britannia Mines high ten-The Britannia Mines high ten-sion line has been tapped close to Horseshoe Bay and a transform-er station erected there. The distribution circuit follows Mar-ine Drive after sending out a branch to serve Whytecliff, and

extends to Shelter Bay serving Gleneagles and Eagle Harbor en route.

The work, which commenced October 13, involves an expenditure of approximately \$20,000 and will take six weeks to complete
