The lecture of Mr. Glendenning, government official, on earwigs and garden pests, under the auspices of the Horticultural Society, was well attended and very highly appreciated by the audience.

After Mr. Glendenning concluded his address he answered many questions and advised how to use the earwig bait to good advantage. He also stressed the necessity of getting one's neighbors to co-operate in putting out the bait at the same time as otherwise the individual would not accomplish much.

K. A. Ray, president of the Society, delivered a short address on the work of the Association and thanked Mr. Glendenning for his most instructive and educational talk.

BUILDING PERMITS TOTAL \$18,995

The municipal hall last month issued seventeen permits of a total value of \$18,995, which is almost double the April figures of \$9,825. The May total was made up of eight dwellings for \$17,150, three garages for \$190, and six additions of a value amounting to \$1,655.

MAY DAY SNAPSHOT COMPETITION

On June 1st, the Club was favored with the presence of Mr. Doug. Cameron, a member of Jericho Tennis Club and North Vancouver Tennis Club, and some exceedingly good men's doubles were enjoyed.

DUROID ROOFS

The Sidney Roofing and Paper Co. Ltd., the manufacturers of "Duroid" roofs, have put on a display in the window of the store at 2458 Marine Drive, which will remain there until next Monday, 6th June. Their factory is situated in Victoria, where they are maintaining three 8-hour shifts a day, only white labor being employed. Their sales for this year, we are informed, are slightly in excess of that for 1931 in spite of the depression. This year twenty-seven houses in West Vancouver have been re-roofed with their product. It was decided that their offer be accepted at the price quoted, i.e., \$97 per \$100 bond.

COUNCIL NOTES

L. C. Reid of the West Vancouver Swimming Club came before the council on Monday night regarding their using the building on Dundarave pier.

The council granted the club the exclusive use of the building from 1st June to 30th September this year on the understanding that they would at their own expense repair and maintain it in good condition during that period.

The engineer reported to the council on:

1. Culvert on Haywood, east of 25th Street. That the installation of this culvert would cost \$262.

The work was approved.

2. Uriah Forrest's application re cutting of alder trees, boulevard, Royal Ave. That these trees are not dangerous.

The clerk was instructed to inform the writer that he may cut down the trees at his own expense.

3. Dangerous tree, Lot 73, D. L. 556.

The clerk was instructed to notify the owner of the said lot or post notice for removal on said tree in accordance with the provisions of By-law No. 73.

4. Culvert on Royal Avenue between Bay Street and Waterfront, Whytecliff.

That this culvert required immediate attention, the estimated cost of repair being \$70.

The work was approved.

5. Opening Dufferin Ave., V. Odum's application. That the estimated cost of this work is \$219.70.

The work was approved.

6. Preliminary estimate of paving repairs. That the various repairs would cost approximately \$542.

The work was approved, the engineer being instructed to include in this work the necessary repairs near the ferry landing.

7. Water supply to D.L. 430, Block 43, Lot 14, except E. 25 feet. That the cost of installing a covered water line to this property would be \$90.

No action taken.

N. A. Marine Engineers wrote the council regarding renewal of engineer's agreement. Referred to the ferry manager.

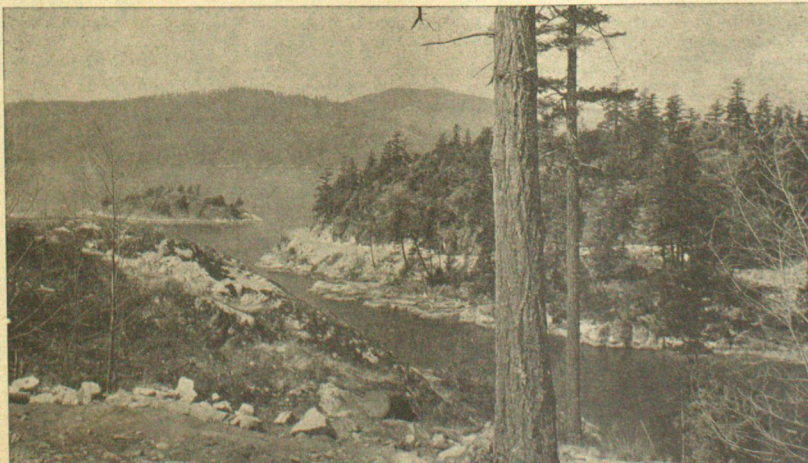
