### Lemon Cookies

2 cups sugar  
2/3 cup butter  
1 lemon  
2 eggs  
2 tablespoons milk  
1 teaspoon soda  
about 1 quart flour.  
Cream butter and sugar. Add  
beaten eggs. Stir in soda dis-  
solved in milk. Add grated rind  
and juice of lemon. Use enough  
flour to handle. Roll thick or  
thin as you prefer. Sprinkle  
sugar on the top before putting  
into the oven.

### Pineapple Salad

1 pkg. lemon jelly  
1 jar cream  
1 pkg. cream cheese  
1/2 can grated pineapple  
1 pimento  
Mix jelly and let it set. Mash  
the cheese in a mixing bowl, add  
cream and whip. Add this mix-  
ture to the jelly, stirring well  
with a fork. Stir in pineapple  
and pimento. Harden in refrig-  
erator. Serve on lettuce leaves  
with mayonnaise.  
This serves eight people.

### USEFUL HINTS FOR THE HOME

White spots made by hot dish-  
es on polished tablees can be re-  
moved by spreading with com-  
mon salt and pure olive oil.  
Leave for some hours, then re-  
move with a clean cloth, and  
polish in the usual way.

To remove iron mould, cut a  
lemon in halves, squeeze out the  
juice, moisten the iron mould  
stain with this, then rub kitchen  
salt on it. After leaving the  
material for two hours, rub it,  
and no trace of the stain will be  
left.

When cream is only slightly  
sour, place in a basin with the  
juice of a lemon and a table-  
spoon of sugar, and whip until  
quite stiff. This is delicious  
served with fruit or pudding.

Use loosely-twisted knitting  
silk instead of wool when darn-  
ing fine wool undergarments.  
When washed this has almost  
the same thickness as the knit-  
ted garment, and the silk does  
not shrink nor pull a larger hole.

Worn linoleum may be patch-  
ed by filling the holes with old  
chipped lino, and covering thor-  
oughly or evenly with glue or  
gum. Leave to dry, then polish  
in the usual way.

Surface scratches on polished  
wood may be removed by apply-  
ing a mixture of turpentine and  
linseed oil in equal parts, and  
rubbing it in with a soft rag.  
Leave for a short time before  
polishing in the usual manner.

When making jam use three  
teaspoonfuls of glycerine to each  
pound of fruit. The glycerine  
will prevent fermentation when  
insufficiently boiled.

When making a baked custard  
cook it very slowly or it will be  
watery. If your oven is too hot,  
place the custard dish in a larger  
dish of water.

Moths in a carpet may be  
killed by covering the infested  
parts with a damp cloth, and  
ironing dry with a hot iron. The  
heat and steam will destroy the  
worms and eggs.
